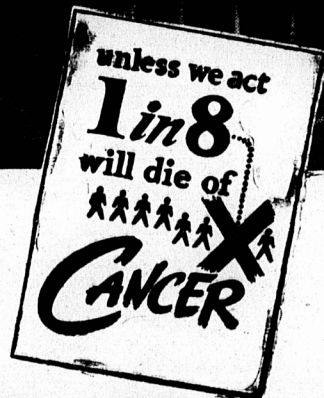

In Memoriam

MR. JAMES H. CHAMPION

On Monday, March 24th, as the shadows of evening deepened, there passed into lasting rest a beloved and highly esteemed resident of Darnley, James H. Champion, in his 67th year. For some time Mr. Champion had suffered from a heart ailment which he bore with patience and fortitude. Kind, considerate and of good counsel he will be missed by all and in every good cause. Friends and neighbours share a common sorrow in the passing of a good man.

On Wednesday afternoon a short service was held at his late residence and the remains then conveyed to the Princetown United Church at Malpeque. The service there was conducted by the pastor, Rev. G. J. Crowdis

assisted by the Rev. James McGowan, pastor of the Kfir Memorial Presbyterian Church. The Rev. L. M. Murray of Kensington presided with unusual acceptance at the pipe organ and rendered in solo, "Jesus Lover of My Soul." The choir was composed of representatives of the two churches. The service by the Masons of King Edward Lodge of Malpeque of which the deceased was a devoted member, was conducted by Donald Baker, Past Grand Master of Hiram of Lebanon Lodge, Summerside. The floral tributes were many and beautiful breathing their quiet assurance of faith and love.
