IN MEMORIAM MR. C. HARRY ACORN.

The funeral of the late C. Harry Acorn, victim of the recent deplorable drowning accident at Lunenburg, N. S., already recorded, was held at Souris on Tuesday afternoon May 19th, when an exceptionally large number of people, of all classes and creeds, gathering from Town and surrounding country, united in paying their last respects to one, who had so suddenly been snatched away in the midst of health and youth, and to show their sympathy with the bereaved relatives.

The deceased young man, who was only 29 years of age, had made many friends and was very popular in his social and business relations. His widow nee, Miss Mavis L. Smith of Windsor, N. S., and little daughter Joyce, six years old, have the heartfelt sympathy of a host of friends, as also his father and mother, his sister Wanda, teacher at Rollo Bay West, his brothers George and Billie at home and Clarence in Los Angeles, California.

The body arrived at Souris, by the S. S. Lovat, on Monday, evening, and was met at the wharf by a large number of friends and was conveyed to the residence of his father, Mr. H. H. Acorn, where it remained until 2 P. M., when it was removed to the Methodist Church, where the funeral services were held. The church beautifully draped, under the leadership of Mrs. E. L. Stewart, was filled to capacity, while many were standing about the door and street.

The services, which were very impressive, were conducted by Rev. E. Lockhart, Minister of the United Church of Souris. The choir led in singing "Rock of Ages," "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Jesus Lover of My Soul," while the solo "Face to Face" by Miss Gertrude Sterns, was beautifully rendered, and well appreciated.

On leaving the church the casket, banked with flowers, was carried past the Souris Cadet Corps, standing at attention with arms reversed, and thence to the Souris West Cemetery, where he was laid to rest. The pall-bearers were: R. C. McLean, Ernest White, Lambert, Cheverier, Howard Paquet, Sydney Drake, and Wade Hughes.

The deceased was born in Charlottetown, on Christmas day, 1895, and the following year removed with his parents to Souris, P. E. I. He received his education at the Souris High School, and the Prince of Wales College, graduating when he was only fifteen years of age. The following year he entered the service of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, in his home town, where he remained until his transfer, the following year, to Montague, P. E. I. Two years later he was transferred to New Glasgow, N. S., and later to Windsor, N. S., where he met his wife.

At the outbreak of the war, he volunteered for overseas service, but owing to defective eyesight was not accepted, but was promoted to the position of Teller in the Head office of the Bank at Halifax, in which capacity he was serving when the Great Explosion occurred suffering minor injuries, some six years ago, he was again promoted to the position of Accountant at Lunenburg, N. S., which position he filled with great satisfaction, until a year ago, when he opened an Insurance and Brokerage office on his own account, and was laying the foundation for successful business when his untimely death occurred.

Further particulars, regarding the sad accident, by which C. Harry Acorn of Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, lost his life, have now come to hand. After the accident had occurred the coroner, Dr. Forbes, decided that an inquest was not necessary, but when Mr. H. H. Acorn, the young man's father, had examined his effects he found that his son had carried a certain amount of life insurance, and he, therefore, requested that an inquest be held. The D. G. S. Arleux, which was in Lunenburg at the time, and whose second officer was on watch when the accident occurred, was accordingly summoned back from Halifax, and the inquest disclosed the following facts.

It appears that Mr. Acorn, who drove a Ford coupe, arrived home about 10.30 P. M., on the night of May 18th and left a note for his wife, who was at the home of a friend, saying that he would be back about 11.30, as he had some

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work to do at his office. He remained at his office until 11.30, when he went to the post office, where he met a friend, who lived on the outskirts of the town, and who asked him to drive him home. Returning, he drove along Water street and was recognized by several people, who saw him turn toward the waterfront, where the roadway leads to the Government wharf. This wharf is connected at its foot, with the wharf of the Acadian Supply, Limited, by a narrow wooden span, without the usual curb or stringpiece, and in attempting to stop or turn, the car skidded and slipped over the plank into the water. The night was foggy and wet, but in the morning, when the planking became dry, the marks of the car were quite plainly seen. The second officer of the Arleux, who was on watch at the time, heard the splash and immediately ran to the forward end of the ship to investigate, but did not hear of see anything further. Thinking that one of the crew of the ship, who was on shore leave, might have fallen into the dock, he went to the fore-castle, and finding all ter hearing the evidence, the coroner's jury returned a verdict of "Accidental death by drowning due to defective auto brakes."

Mr. Acorn was a close, personal friend of Capt. Harry Cousins, of the Arleux, who was sailing for Halifax early on Tuesday morning and it is presumed that his visit to the wharf was for the purpose of bidding Capt. Cousins good-bye. The sad affair cast a gloom over the whole town of Lunenburg, many of whose people have also much sympathy is expressed by his widow and parents.

Services were held at his late residence, Pelham Street, and at the Railway station, under the auspices of the Rising Sun Lodge, I. O. O. F., of which the deceased was a member. The Rev. Mr. Arleux, pastor of the Lunenburg Methodist Church officiated. The body was identified as being that of C. H. Acorn. An expert mechanic was engaged to examine the car, who testified that he island, for interment.—Cor.
