**QUEBEC S.S. LINE.**—The Cascadia arrived in Charlottetown Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock and sailed the same night for Pictou. She will return here Thursday afternoon and after discharging her cargo will load freight for Montreal. Her outward cargo will consist chiefly of cheese and other sundries and she will also have a large passenger list.

**OPENING OF CITY SCHOOLS.**—The primary schools of Charlottetown opened yesterday, after the mid-summer holidays, for the first term of the new school year. The opening was attended by satisfactory results as regards attendance of pupils. In each case the attendance amounted to a considerable percentage of the numbers enrolled on the school registers at the closing for the vacation. Moreover, in each case also the figures of the enrollment of pupils yesterday were somewhat in advance of those at the opening after the summer holidays last year. At Prince street school, where Mr. J. D. Seaman is Principal, the number of pupils enrolled was 330; at Queen's Square, Principal Mr. J. Landring, 234 and at West Kent, Principal, Mr. H. Johnson, 300. As usual all that was done yesterday consisted of the grading of the pupils and the pupils were dismissed at noon. The school work commences in earnest to-day, as the usual hours.

**IN HALIFAX.**—Messrs. C. C. Toombs, E. Nicholson, D. A. McKinnon, D. J. McDonald, Charlottetown, and Mr. H. H. Acorn, Souris, are registered at the Queen Hotel, Halifax. Messrs. W. H. **MOTOR DELIVERY WAGON.**—On the Northumberland last night there came for Mr. Alexander R. McKay, of East Royalty, a motor delivery wagon. This is the first to be introduced here since the law came into force permitting automobiles to run again in Charlottetown and Royalty. The wagon, which is to be used solely in Mr. McKay's milk delivery business, is of the McKay make and of 30 horse-power.

**REMAINS ARRIVE.**—The body of the late Mrs. Frank Magnett, arrived in Charlottetown last night by the express from Haverhill, Mass., and was accompanied by the husband of the deceased. The late Mrs. Magnett, who was before marriage a Miss Maria Cougan, passed away last Sunday of heart disease, at the age of 52 years. The remains will be forwarded to St. Teresa this morning where the funeral takes place to-day to the Catholic church, thence to the St. Teresa cemetery.

**A TRAVELLED VISITOR.**—There has been staying at the Revere Hotel, Charlottetown, during the past four days a Capt. and Mrs. Heaslop, of England. They came last from Bermuda in the course of some extensive travelling. Capt. Heaslop, a retired navy man is a widely travelled person. He has been to pretty nearly every part of the world whither civilization has reached to her moulding hand. With Mrs. Heaslop, the captain left here on Tuesday morning for Hunter River, where they intend to put in some days fishing. The Captain being an ardent disciple of Isaac Walton. Though his stay in Charlottetown, in fact on the island, has been up to the present only a week's duration Capt. Heaslop has formed a very favorable impression of the Garden of the Gulf and its people; is delighted with the natural beauties of the Island. From Hunter River, it is the Captains intention to leave the island by way of Summerside.

**METHODIST MEETING.**—The financial meeting of the Charlottetown District of the Methodist Church opened Tuesday evening at Murray Harbour. Rev. H. A. Brown preached an appropriate sermon and this was followed by the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. Yesterday morning at nine o'clock there was a devotional half hour led by Rev. George Orman. The program of the day included addresses on the following subjects: "The Minister's Personal Life and its Relation to his Work" by Rev. J. L. Dawson, "The Minister's Duties to his Circuit and the Circuit's Duty to its Minister" by Rev. J. Heaney; "The Responsibility of the Church for its own Progress and Development" by Rev. Hugh Miller. These subjects were discussed in brief addresses. During the day an important business session was held. In the evening at 7.30 there was a public meeting and the following addresses: "The Relation of the District to Sunday Schools" by Rev. D. E. Styles, and "The Relation of the District to Educational Work" by Rev. E. A. Westmoreland.

**NUMBER INCREASING.**—The number of motor cars in use in the province is steadily increasing, which shows the popularity of this means of conveyance. It is estimated that up to the present there are about twenty-eight to thirty motor cars on the Island, and this within the few weeks that the law came into force permitting the operation of this type of vehicle over prescribed roads. Of this number of cars, about twenty-five are owned in Charlottetown, the remaining few in Summerside. The majority of the cars are of the Motor Cars make, but there are also several Cadillac and Ford's, while Royal's Pierce-Arrow are other types of machines in use. **INCREASED TRAVEL.**—The Guardian is informed by Railway men that travel on the P. E. I. R. this year far exceeds anything in the history of the road. A feature of this year's movements is that travel has been continuous, since the first of May. It is not an uncommon thing to be obliged to put additional cars to the train as they are moving out. The railway people are looking forward to unusually heavy freight traffic this fall on account of the exceedingly large harvest.

**WELL SUPPLIED.**—Charlottetown seems to have bandmen in abundance so much so that another band has been started in order that each man should be utilized. The new band is called the Charlottetown Brass Band, and made its first appearance on Charlottetown streets on Sunday last, when some excellent music was rendered. The band also turned out with the L. F. U. on Labor Day and supplied the music for the sports in the afternoon. The leader of the new band is Mr. John McFarlane, formerly leader of the Fourth Regiment Band and Messrs. Johnson, N. McFarlane, Cairns, and J. and C. Doyle, formerly of the Fourth Regiment band are also members of the new band. Charlottetown ought not to be wanting any in the way of band music with four brass bands.

**WEDDING BELLS.**—The marriage of Miss Ethel M. Bridges, daughter of Mr. Phillip Bridges of this city, to Mr. Erskin P. Stavert, son of Mr. Peter Stavert of Wilmot, P. E. I., Accountant of the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Amherst, took place at seven o'clock yesterday morning in Zion Church, the Pastor Rev. George C. Taylor officiating. This was the first wedding to be solemnized in the new church, which was artistically decorated with golden glow and palms. Both bride and groom were unattended. The bride was attired in a travelling suit of blue with hat to match and carried a bouquet of bride roses, lilies of the valley and maiden-hair fern. The wedding was a quiet one, the guests being the immediate relatives of the bride and groom. During the ceremony, Mendessohn's Wedding March was rendered by Professor McIntyre and the choir sang "The Voice that Breathed O'er Eden." After the ceremony, Mr. and Mrs. Stavert left by the express en route to Quebec, where they will spend a fortnight's honeymoon. The people of Charlottetown deeply regretted to learn yesterday that Mr. Theophilus Moore of this city had passed away on Monday morning. Mr. Moore had been in ill health and was given leave of absence from his duties in the Customs Department several weeks ago and he proceeded to the home of his son, Dr. E. P. Moore, of South Bend, Indiana. On arrival at the son's home he was compelled to retire to bed where he passed away. A slight operation was performed which relieved his heart and lungs for a short time, but his strength did not return.

Mr. Moore was the eldest son of the late Mr. George Moore, of the Bank of Prince Edward Island and a grandson of the late James Moore, Esquire, who was for many years one of the first citizens of Charlottetown. He was born in the 6th of May, 1842, and was therefore in his seventy-second year. For many years he was Assistant Collector of Inland Revenue in Charlottetown and on the 1st of May 1911 was promoted to the position of Collector.

He leaves to mourn their great loss and to cherish his memory a widow and four surviving children including Dr. Edwin P. Moore of South Bend, Dr. Garnet W. Moore of Seattle, Mrs. Arthur Douce and Miss Ethel Moore at home; and his brothers Colonel F. S. Moore and Mr. George M. Moore of the firm of Moore & McLeod. 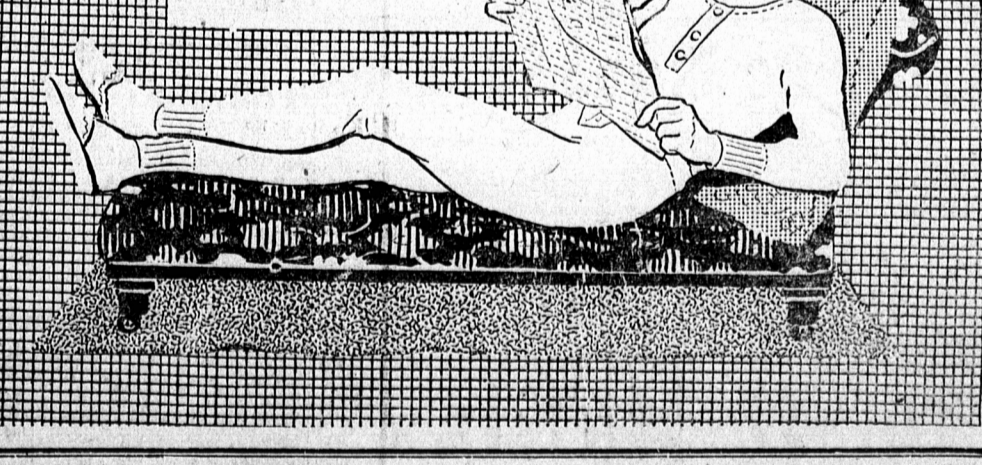
