which were raised to maturity, and they would certainly be very difficult to excel anywhere. All three were large, very heavily furred, with beautiful necks and clear color, with large brushes and well defined white tips. Another interesting fox was a Male pup from Pen 40 Vimy. This pup is about medium size, Dark Silver, and his parents were both of prize winning strains. He is reared like an adult, the guard fur running right down to the tips being of a beautiful lustrous color, the silver beautifully sprinkled on the hips bright and sparkling. His brush and tip were

as fully matured as an adult, and he is certainly a most remarkable pup. He too had been started for the Royal Winter Fair. A Dark Silver Male from Pen 60 in the Vimy ranch, a son of "MacKinnon 59" International Dark Silver Champion of America 1923 and the fox with the largest brush and tip in the world, was greatly admired. This pup takes after his sire and is an outstanding individual in many respects, including brush and tip. A lovely Dark Silver Male was shown from Pen 45 in the Vimy ranch. In size, conformation and fur qualities it would be difficult to believe that he is a pup he is so matured. In females some excellent specimens were shown from Pens 21, 59 and 71 in the Vimy ranch. These range from Dark to Pales and two of them were real Show foxes. Another pup which the on-lookers were much interested in was a Medium Silver Male from Pen 34 in the Vimy ranch. The parents of this pup produced "Vimy Agnes" the World's Champion fox in 1922, and last year at the Royal Winter Fair three pups from this pen entered in three different classes won a First, a Second and a Third. A Dark Silver Female pup from Pen 39 was pronounced a dream. She is certainly very beautiful. She is one of those heavily furred females, her underfur being clear slate color, her guard fur a raven blue-black, and her Silver being of the veiled variety, clear and beautiful over the hips; a magnificent brush and very large tip complete the makeup of this,

References to Passing Of Queen Mother In City Churches

Respect for the memory of Her Majesty the Dowager Queen Alexandra was marked during the morning service at St. Paul's yesterday. Very lovely flowers placed upon the Communion Table are to be presented today to the Patients in the Prince Edward Island Hospital. Rev. Mr. Raymond touchingly referred to the Advent of the beautiful Danish Princess, whose arrival in England on that snowy day in March 1863 was heralded with wondrous rejoicing throughout the land.

Down through the intervening years as Princess, Queen and Mother by her grace and charm, beauty and breadth of the Empire this today is sorrowing.

Mr. Raymond concluded by reading "Tennyson's Welcome to Alexandra, March 7th, 1863; which will be found in another column in this issue.

After the sermon the congregation stood during the playing of the Dead March followed by the Hymn, "Now the Labourer's Task is O'er." Fitting reference was also made at the morning service in St. James Church by the Rev. W. Bruce Muir, who spoke feelingly of the life and good works of the Queen Mother, her consistent religious life and the love entertained for her from the time of her arrival in England to the day of her death.

At St. Peter's Cathedral, Rev. E. M. Malone made reference at the morning service to the passing of Queen Alexandra speaking of her as being conspicuous as a woman, mother, wife, and queen, and as being an example to the womanhood of the Empire. After the of- fatory, the Russian Anthem, "For the Departed" was sung as a tribute to the memory of the late Queen Mother.

At the United Church Rev. A. N. Gillis also paid touching tribute to her late Majesty.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, Nov. 23 - Eggs - Market conditions remain practically unchanged. The British Columbia market is very firm and prices are expected to advance slightly at an early date. The firm undertone in British Columbia is attributed to shipment from this province to Alberta.

Toronto jobbing fresh specials 70, fresh extras 68, storage 45, fresh firsts 56, storage 42, seconds 36. Montreal is very firm jobbing price remain unchanged. Quebec is paying country points extras 60, firsts 50, seconds 32.

Ottawa fresh extras retailing 75, fresh firsts 65 to 70, storage 50 to 55.

Winnipeg egg market is firm, storage stocks moving freely into consumptive channels. Demand is good jobbing prices remain steady. Saskatchewan markets quiet, storage stocks supplying local demand. Alberta markets unchanged. British Columbia market is firm, jobbing extras 63, firsts 61, seconds and pullets 50. Saint John fair demand, jobbing fresh extras 60, storage 45, fresh firsts 50, storage 43, fresh second 45, storage 40.

MONTREAL, Nov. 22 - There was a good demand for Canadian wheat on the Montreal market Saturday in nearby positions and as cables were stronger at a further advance of 6d per quarter some business was worked, and sales of several loads of oats were made. The demand from exporters for wheat on the spot was steady and further sales of No. 1 northern were made at 14 1/2 cents per bushel over the Winnipeg November option and No. 2 northern at 11 1/2 cents per bushel over c. i. l. Montreal and odd round lots of oats also changed hands at c. i. f. prices. There was a moderate demand for oats in the local coarse grain market and the feeling was very firm but there was no actual change in prices. A stronger feeling developed in the spring wheat and winter wheat flour markets. The former grades were advanced 10 cents per barrel while the latter were marked up 25 cents per barrel. The feature of the mill feed trade was the firmer tone and prices were advanced one dollar per ton. Owing to the scarcity of supplies, the market for fresh eggs was stronger and prices closed five cents per dozen higher and the indications are that they will go still higher in the near future as the demand at this period of the year is in excess of the offerings. The trade in storage eggs was fair and prices were marked up one cent per dozen.

A stronger tone developed in the butter market last week and prices closed with a net gain of 1-4 to 1-2 cents per pound. Demand was steady and considerable business was transacted. The cheese market was decidedly more active than it has been of late and prices were steady owing to the improved demand from foreign buyers. Current market were purchased on Friday and Saturday at 19 1/4, 19 1/2, 19 9/16, 19 3/4 cents per pound f.o.b.

Legislative Assembly

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Rules Relating to Private Bills

36. All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37. No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38. A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated, The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39. So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40. No Bill for the particular interests of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time and all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

41. No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or body Corporate to apply for such Bill.
