Details of Yugoslavia's partition have already been discussed between German officials, King Boris of Bulgaria and Count Ciano of Italy. It is reported that the map shows how Italy is to receive part of Dalmatia and southern Serbia, joining a new Bulgarian border south of Skoplje. Montenegro is slated to become an Italian "protectorate", the report said Bulgaria would get part of southern Serbia as well as a slice of Greece, and Hungary would get a share in the north. The Croa province would become independent. Only Rumania gets no share of the spoils.

Queen's Canadian Fund donations

The Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims has opened its national appeal with the approval of Prime Minister Mackenzie King, Sir George Wilkinson, Lord Mayor of London, and Lord Beaverbrook. The fund, supported by Canadian newspapers with a combined circulation of more than 2,000,000, will not organize public canvasses but will provide a channel for voluntary subscriptions. The money will be distributed through the Lord Mayor of London's National Air Raid Relief Fund. Lord Beaverbrook, in endorsing the fund, wrote: "The spirit of England needs no buttress. But many of the homes of England have been scattered and broken. Her people will struggle unaided against danger and destruction. But what an opportunity is here for practical demonstration of the admiration that stirs all through the Empire today!"

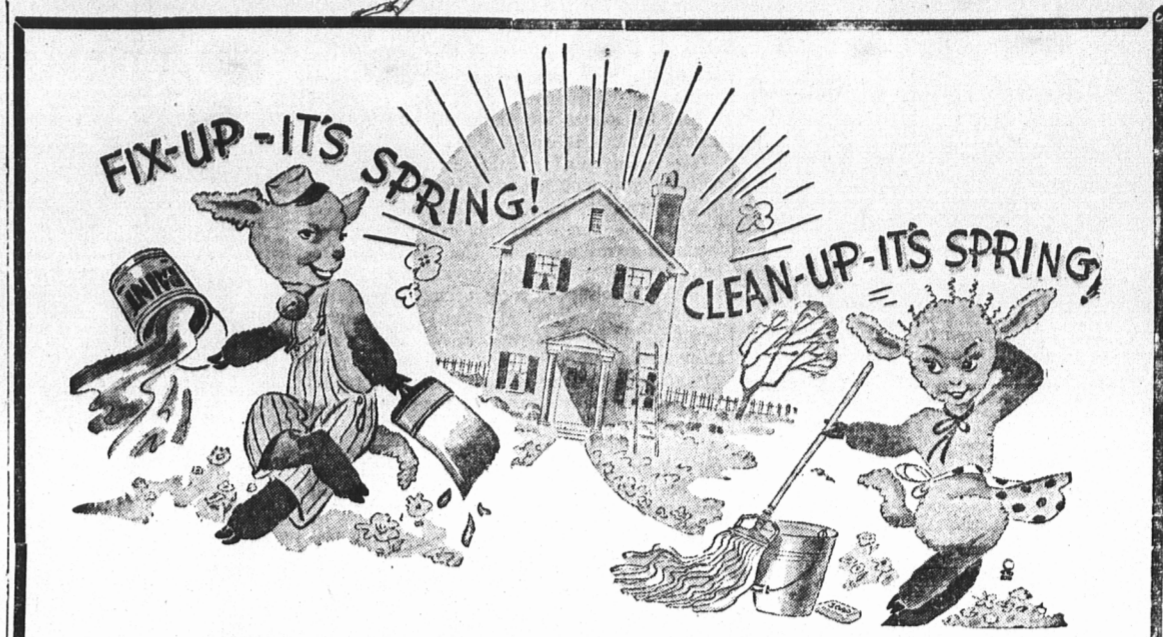
The War This Week

President Roosevelt, warning the public against allowing their feelings to range from the pinnacles of hope to the depths of despair as the fortunes of battle sway, took important steps in the 86th week of the war to bring more effective United States support to the aid of Britain and the Empire.
Declarations by four of the President's closest advisers, emphasizing American determination to see that supplies reach Britain were interpreted in Washington as pointing to an early decision in favor of United States naval protection for convoys in the western half of the North Atlantic.

In the declaration of Hyde Park signed by President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Mackenzie King, the United States and Canada agreed to pool all their resources and co-ordinate all their facilities for the production of the tools with which the war will be won.

Continued allied reverses in Greece caused political squalls both in Britain and Australia. Prime Minister Churchill pleaded with Parliament to keep its sense of proportion and scheduled a broadcast to the Empire for Sunday. Prime Minister R. G. Menzies of Australia made a strong defence of the decision to send Australian troops to Greece.

This week saw abandonment by the allies of the northern defence lines running west from Mount Olympus. For the rest of the week the allied troops fought off the unceasing assault of the enemy in the vicinity of Thermopylae. Greek forces in the extreme northwestern part of the country gave up the fight. King George and the

Glancing Back 25 Years: - The Irish Easter rebellion of 1916 was set off when extremists attempted to land arms and ammunition from a German ship off the west coast, April 21. A few days later Sir Roger Casement, who had made the trip from Germany on a submarine accompanying the merchant vessel, was captured. Disorders started in Dublin April 24 and British troops were sent into the capital and other parts of Ireland to quell the rebellion which lasted about a week.

WARNING TO ROLLER-SKATERS

The following is a section taken from the By-law regulating Roller Skating: -
BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL of the City of Charlottetown as follows: -
No person shall hereafter roller-skate upon any portion of any public street, parkway or highway within the City at any time between sunset and sunrise; for the purpose of this by-law sunset shall be taken to occur at the time of general lighting of street lamps in the City
