**Christmas Menus For Christmas Travellers**

MONTREAL, Dec. 12.—Holiday travellers may have their share of all the good things to eat pertaining to the festive season while enroute, for turkey and all the trimmings will be the feature of Christmas and New Year meals on the dining cars of the Canadian National Railways, several thousand plump birds having been selected and prepared for the delectation of those who must spend part of their holidays on trains, according to plans announced by W. W. Swinden, general superintendent of sleeping, dining and parlor car department of the Canadian National system. In keeping with the practice adopted some time ago, which has greatly popularized the dining car among the travelling public, meals will be served at fixed prices, in addition to the regular a la carte service, including choice Christmas dishes. These will be featured on a holiday-becked menu slip and will include, in addition to the traditional turkey and trimmings, old English plum pudding or mince pie fashioned from a famous old English recipe. These holiday meals will be on the menu of all dining cars of the Canadian National Railways from Dec. 21 to Jan. 2 inclusive.

**Defends Canadian Trade Treaty**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—(C.P.)—Moving to defend the Canadian Trade Treaty against the protests of western cattlemen, Secretary of State Hull maintained today that the reduction in livestock tariffs would gain them more than they would lose. The Secretary made this assertion in a letter written to Senator Costigan, Colorado Democrat on Nov. 26, but made public by the State Department only today. It replied to one by Costigan on Nov. 2, before the Canadian Pact was concluded, containing the pleas of westerners that no reductions be made in the United States duty on Canadian Cattle.

**Accuses Police Of Robberies**

TORONTO, Dec. 13.—(C.P.)—A band of 25 police constables known as "100 per cent" gang have been systematically robbing Toronto stores and factories, former constable William J. White declared today before the Police Commission inquiry into conduct of police constable Michael O'Shea and circumstances of his reinstatement in the force.

White, who served a reformatory term for entering a downtown shop, said to his knowledge the thefts had been going on since 1910, a period of 25 years. He directly involved O'Shea, saying he had seen him coming out of shops with bundles.

Mayor James Simpson declared White's evidence had changed the nature of the inquiry from investigation of one individual to a searching inquiry into activities of the other officers.

Names of the 25 constables as submitted by White were withheld from publication. It was announced Chief Constable D. C. Draper would make a full report of a check on White's evidence.

Wholesale fruit, drygoods and shoe stores, warehouses, a pickle factory, automobile part shops and other places had been looted the former constable said.

**AWARD FELLOWSHIP TO TORONTO YOUTH**

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—(C.P.)—Charles (Sandy) Jones, formerly of Toronto, has been awarded a fellowship by the Julliard Foundation of New York. The fellowship is awarded annually to young composers who show unusual promise.

Jones, a young violinist and composer, has appeared in recital here and made a favorable impression. The award will enable him to continue his studies with Bernard Wagenaar, noted Dutch composer now living in the United States.

The award was granted for two large chamber music works—a trio and a violin-piano sonata—which Jones completed in Canada during the summer months.

**Sponge Jewelry The Rage In Nassau**

NASSAU, Bahamas, Dec. 13.—A new fad taken up by early resort arrivals in Nassau is jewelry for beach wear made from native sponges.

A debutante who visited the local sponge market last season originated the idea of dyeing small sponges in brilliant colors and stringing them into necklaces, bracelets and anklets. Appearing at Paradi Beach with sponge jewelry in contrasting colors to her Tahitian bathing-suit, she found her friends copying her colorful accessories.

Local merchants took up the idea and developed it, creating a market for their small sponges.
