**Savants Start College Inquiry in Uses of Soap**

New Ways of Washing Face Sought by Scientists in Unique Research

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Oct. 9 — (Special)—The science of soap making was added to the courses in American colleges today, with the announcement by Prof. Victor Lenher, professor of chemistry at the University of Wisconsin, that Paul H. Fall, 5600 Drexel Boulevard, Chicago, has been awarded the \$2,000 Palmolive Fellowship to begin the first concerted research in the history of the soap industry.

The fellowship will be given annually after this by the Palmolive Company for the purpose of making scientific studies in various American universities of the fundamental principles of chemistry, physics and colloids connected with the detergent action of soap. The winning candidate is permitted to work in any college in the country which is properly equipped for research of this kind.

"Mr. Fall, who will be the pioneer in the efforts to discover new ways to wash the hands and face, dishes and the family linen, will begin his work this autumn at Cornell University. He is himself a college professor, teaching chemistry.

"Mr. Fall will be assisted in his research studies in soap by Prof. W. D. Bancroft of Cornell, a leader in this field," said Professor Lenher today.

"The Palmolive Company will support this fellowship annually in order to aid the soap industry in finding improved ways of soap manufacturing to insure scientific accuracy in cleansing the skin, linen, woodwork, etc.


