

Leafs Shut Out Habs 2-0, Detroit Wins 9-4 From Boston Saturday

TORONTO, Feb. 12 (CP) — It took Toronto Maple Leafs only 19 seconds Saturday night to get the goals they needed to beat Montreal Canadiens 2-0 and put at least a temporary end to two National Hockey League deadlocks.

The triumph before 14,583 fans broke the second place tie between the two clubs. The Leafs moved two points ahead of their rivals who have a game in hand.

Veteran Turk Broda out in front of Montreal's Bill Durnan in the shutout race. They were tied with seven apiece before the Toronto goalie came through with his eighth of the season.

DETROIT 9, BOSTON 4

BOSTON, Feb. 12 (AP) — Jerry Couture scored four times and Gordie Howe collected three markers as the top-place Detroit Red Wings exploded their vaunted scoring power to crush Boston Bruins 9-4 in a rugged National Hockey League game before a 12,296 crowd Saturday night. Three of the Couture tallies came in a row within a nine-minute space of the third period.

Unable to top the Bruins in their five previous clashes, the Red Wings raced off to a flying start by rolling up a 4-0 lead during the opening session.

As the score mounted in the Red Wings' favor, Boston tempers soared and there were two lively fist battles.

Lindsay and Johnny Peirson drew majors for battling during the first period and Fernie Flaman and Steve Black drew five-minute sentences after swapping several lusty punches in the third period.

Much of Detroit's scoring could be traced to goalie Jack Gelleneau's groin injury. He had stayed out the two previous games and would have been rested again Saturday night if a replacement had been available.

Injured Boxer May Be Retired

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 9 — (AP) — Harold Johnson, 22-year old Philadelphia light heavyweight who collapsed in the arena ring while fighting Jersey Joe Walcott last night, may be retired from boxing by the Pennsylvania State Athletic Commissioner.

Commissioner John (Ox) Dargosa, after releasing the purses of the two fighters at a hearing today, said the Commission's Medical Advisory Board will investigate Johnson's conditions.

"If the Medical Advisory Board's investigation discloses the condition of Johnson's back is chronic and is likely to incapacitate him again, especially in the ring, the

sensible thing to do for his own good and protection of the fans would be to retire him," Dargosa said.

Johnson is in hospital where a dozen X-rays of his back have been taken.

His collapse in the third round without being hit was caused by what physicians diagnosed as either a dislocated disk in the spine or a separation of the sacroiliac.

The young Negro had dropped only one of his 29 fights prior to last night.

Don Newcombe Signs Contract

BROOKLYN, N.Y., Feb. 11 — (AP) — Big Don Newcombe, Brooklyn's sensational rookie pitcher of 1949, signed his contract today for a reported \$13,000 salary.

Neither the Brooklyn club nor Newcombe would confirm the financial terms. He probably got \$7,000 or \$8,000 last year, exclusive of his World Series cheque.

Newcombe graduated to Brooklyn from Montreal Royals in mid-May last season.

The huge Negro righthander was a sensation last summer, with a 17-8 record for the Dodgers. He was voted to the all-star team after only six weeks in the majors.

No Special Public Works Program Planned

OTTAWA, Feb. 9 — (CP) — The Federal Government does not intend to submit a special public investment program to Parliament at the coming session.

Resources Minister Winters said in an interview that no plans have been made for special public works projects that would relieve unemployment, estimated at 323,000 Jan. 12 last. But this did not mean that no such projects will be undertaken during the year.

He expects to ask Parliament to approve another reconstruction vote, similar to the \$2,000,000 approved at the last session.

The money is available to all departments to plan or initiate public investment projects for which no special vote has been provided. Once the project was planned or started the department concerned could go to Parliament and ask for money to cover the cost of completing the work.

Some departments now are using the money voted at the last session. The Transport Department, for instance, has drawn on the fund to initiate runway construction at New Brunswick airports. The work was helping to relieve unemployment in the Province.

Mr. Winters said he does not know whether public investment projects will be a major topic of discussion at the general Dominion-Provincial conference called for this fall.

FINED \$25,000

TORONTO, Feb. 10 — (CP) — William Jay Cutler, former securities salesman, today was fined \$25,000 and costs for falsifying his 1945 income tax return. Cutler gave notice of appeal. Cutler, formerly with Carlton Securities, Ltd., testified he had an arrangement with his employer whereby money earned during the final 10 months of 1945 would be non-taxable income.
