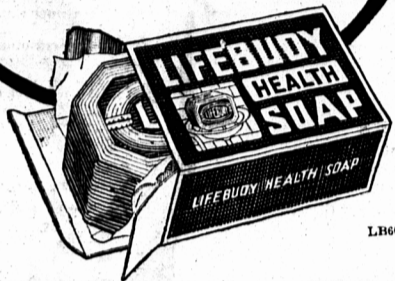

BELL GOVT.'S HUGE DEFICITS

At Dec. 31, 1918, Mr. A. W. Hyndman, Manager of the Royal Bank, and External Auditor for the Government, reported the net debt of the province to be \$1,006,991.71
At Dec. 8, 1919, Messrs. J. J. Hughes, M.P., and Mr. Hyndman, External Auditors showed the net debt to be \$1,193,829.77
An increase of \$ 186,838.06
At Sept. 8, 1919, Mr. John Anderson, Provincial Auditor, showed the excess of expenditure over receipts, less unearned subsidy, to be \$ 253,938.78
An excess difference of \$ 67,100.72

WHICH IS CORRECT?

These are two alleged audits in the interests of the Bell Government to the same date, showing a difference of \$67,100.72—both cannot be correct. Which does the Bell Government accept—is it going to turn down Mr. Hughes and Mr. Hyndman? If so, why?

ANOTHER REPORT

gain, the Provincial Auditor, at the request of the Public Accounts Committee of the session of 1920, submitted an official statement of the position of the province at Dec. 31, 1919, which took the place of the External Audit, showing the Public Debt at that date to be \$1,121,487.23
An increase over 1919 (the first year reported on by the Bell Government) of 114,405.52
An increase over 1911 (the last year of the previous Liberal Govt.) of 118,174.30

NOTE:—The Conservative Government erected 31 permanent bridges at a cost of \$116,366.80, besides purchasing two agricultural buildings in Charlottetown and Summerside respectively, and installing a complete new heating and lighting system in the Provincial Building.

WELCH, Va., April 2.—After seven years of experimenting, S. E. Collier of this city, has perfected a new internal combustion engine, which tests so far have proved superior to gasoline motors in that it triples the efficiency of automobile engines. Collier's motor, it is asserted, will attain an efficiency of approximately 65 per cent, as compared with from 15 to 20 per cent. attained by motors now in use. The motor embodies the discovery of no new principle, merely a new application of the full powers of internal combustion engines. Collier has solved the problem of applying the power of motor, not to the piston, but to the rim of the wheel. Thus he has brought about increased leverage, which is reflected in efficiency. The inventor says his motor will reduce displacement and fuel consumption to a great extent. It will enable an automobile to travel from 55 to 60 miles on a gallon of gasoline. But the motor is not strictly a gasoline engine. It may be operated with steam, oil or compressed air, and by reason of its high efficiency, a motor weighing 125 pounds will be large enough for any automobile. The new motor has one spark plug, no pistons, no crankshaft, no gears. It contains only 117 parts, while a Ford motor has 352. Due to its simplicity, Mr. Collier is of the opinion that when made in quantity it may be sold at from \$50 to \$75. HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE IS ROBBERED OF ITS OVERWHELMING TERRORS. NEW YORK, April 2.—High blood pressure is robbed of its overwhelming terrors and reduced to medical control in 70 per cent. of cases by the results of an investigation announced by Dr. Henry Allen Higley, pathologist of the Brooklyn Eye and Ear Hospital, who for five years has worked on this subject with Dr. Cyrus W. Field, pathologist of Bellevue. They credit Dr. D. D. Van Slyke, of the Rockefeller Institute, with invaluable assistance. Hardening of the arteries has been credited inaccurately with responsibility for an exaggerated proportion of high blood pressure cases, Dr. Higley said today, and this arterio-sclerosis, an incurable condition, has been accepted as an indication of incurable character for the high blood pressure cases erroneously charged to that cause. Diagnosis of high blood pressure, largely confined to middle age, has hitherto focussed on analysis of the normal conditions in the blood and blood without adequate discovery of functional inactivity of the kidneys and its causes and removal, the physician explained. The investigations of his associates and himself, he said, have developed treatment and a formula for curing the ately established abnormal constituents in the blood, and of abnormal proportions of normal constituents. The new method, Dr. Higley said, discloses accurately the character and exact proportions of such ab-
