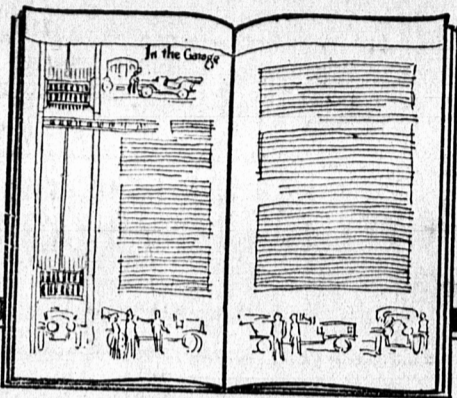

WINDSOR'S POPULATION TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND

WINDSOR, July 23.—The new city directory just issued gives the population of Windsor at 25,000, or an increase over 1913 of approximately 1,000. In 1910 the population was 17,534; in 1911, 18,220; 1912, 19,877, and last year 22,080. The estimated population of the five border municipalities, Windsor, Walkerville, Sandwich, Port City and Ojibway, is placed at 36,000. This covers a river frontage of seven miles.

CANALIA CHANCES AT OLYMPIC GAMES.

LONDON, July 23.—James Merrick, Canadian delegate to the Olympic Congress at Paris, sails by the steamer Alaudia for Montreal today. Discussing Canadian chances in the Olympic games, Mr. Merrick expresses the opinion that the Canadians' best chances were in the field and track events, especially the former. George Goulding's walking should credit the Canadian team with many points. In swimming, not only should George Hodgson score again but the diving and team competitions should afford opportunities for the Canadians to distinguish themselves.

There was an excellent chance for the Canadians in some of the rowing events; for instance, the double skiff and the double four without coxswains. The Canadians should also excel in traps, rifle and revolver shooting, provided the Dominion Rifle Association give the games the consideration they deserved. Canada's chances were poor in tennis, fencing and the equestrian events but good in cycling and yacht racing. The yacht measurements which have been greatly reduced through English, Canadian and Sweden representations, will give the Canadians an opportunity to build and transport their own yachts. Previously yachting has been practically closed to all countries, except those adjacent to the nation holding the games. The two classes of yachts which will suit Canadians best are those for six and eight metres with crews of three and five men respectively.

Canadian boxers and wrestlers should also score. The catch-as-catch-can wrestling events are extremely attractive to Canadians. Mr. Merrick expressed his satisfaction that Britain and Canada had adhered to the majority favoring the admission of women to certain classes of sport; for instance, golf, swimming and tennis, though France and United States were opposed to the innovation.

CHARGED WITH ATTEMPTED MURDER AND SUICIDE.

MONTREAL, July 23.—Giuseppe Donatelli, aged 30, is in a hospital under arrest on the double charge of attempting to murder his sweetheart Lucia De Gregorio, 741 Ontario street west, and committing suicide. The attempt on the girl's life took place early yesterday morning, when Donatelli is said to have slashed her throat with a shoemaker's knife just as she was about to enter her place of employment at St. Somers building. The assault was made because she had rejected Donatelli's advances. Donatelli was arrested at the home of an Italian compatriot, and as his throat was cut he was taken to the hospital. Both he and the girl are likely to recover, although at the hospital where Lucia is, it is said her condition is serious.

THE PLANT LINE.

Mr. H. L. Chipman, Eastern Manager of the Plant Line S. S. Co., Halifax, yesterday afternoon called upon Mr. James Carragher, the agent of the Line here, to tell him that the S. S. Halifax would likely arrive in Charlottetown on her first trip this year, at noon to-day. CANADIAN VISITORS IN LONDON

LONDON, July 23.—The register of the Canadian high commissioner's office shows an abnormal number of visiting Canadians this season, one day recently yielding 250 signatures, a fact which emphasizes the need for securing ample accommodation. While no decision has yet been reached regarding a new site, the general feeling seems to favor the erection of a special building for Canada.

The chief difference of opinion seems to be whether this site should be at Westminster, Aldwych, or the West End.

Secretary G. L. Griffith has lately had the offices renovated and extended somewhat, while, if necessary, additional rooms can be secured. Nevertheless, the Victoria Street premises are scarcely modern enough to allow of greatly developing the accommodation. On the whole the district seems to be regarded as eminently suitable, but not the present building.

NEW POTATOES IN ST. JOHN.

ST. JOHN, July 24.—New potatoes made their appearance on the market on Wednesday and were selling at \$1.50 a bushel at the boats. Some of the last year's potatoes which came down at the same time sold at \$3 a barrel. Farmers say that prospects are good for a fair crop of potatoes. Green peas sold at the boat at \$1.50 a bushel and strawberries brought eleven cents; by the crate. All along the St. John river, the spruce trees and covered with swarms of the spruce bug moth and this pest is working great havoc among the trees.

SIX THOUSAND INSIDE IRON WORKERS OF N. Y. STRIKE.

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 24.—A general strike of 6,000 inside iron workers has been called to go into effect next week for the enforcement of a new wage scale and working conditions. The main demands are a nine-hour working day, five days in a week, a five-hour working day on Saturday, a minimum wage of twenty dollars a week for finishers, \$16 for helpers and \$12 for apprentices. A committee was appointed to ask the housemiths to take sympathetic action.

AN UNUSAL WEDDING.

NEW YORK, July 23.—What happens during the performance of a wedding ceremony when the officiating minister or alderman comes to that part of the service which he says, "With this ring I thee wed," and there isn't any finger to slip the ring upon? The answer was absurdly simple to those who witnessed the marriage of Miss Marie Lorano, 24 years old, of 2884 West Fifteenth street, to Charles Gerardi, also 24, of the same address, at the Borough Hall today. Miss Lorano is the "armless woman" at one of the Coney Island side shows. Her husband is a "hot-spot" man at the same resort. After the bride-to-be had given the data required in the marriage license application Deputy City Clerk Maher, following the accustomed practice, exclaimed: "Hold up your right hands and swear that the statements herein contained are true." There was an embarrassing pause, and then one of the bridal party stepped forward and explained that it was impossible for the bride to raise her right arm, as she had no right arm, nor a left either. Mr. Maher deliberated over the advisability of having the applicant raise her right foot, but hastily decided to waive all formality and swore her without. There was another difficulty to be surmounted when it came to signing the marriage certificate. But here the young woman came to the assistance of the officials by deftly slipping the low-cut shoe from her right foot revealing five nimble toes, clad in a glove-like stocking. Seizing the pen with her toes she affixed her signature, while Alderman John S. Gaynor, who performed the ceremony, looked on in amazement.

MENAGERIE FOR QUEBEC

RICHMOND HILL, July 23.—At a point in the woods of Forest Park, 500 feet back from Myrtle Avenue, opposite Merz's Hotel, corner of Myrtle Avenue and Washington street, work is progressing on an inclosure and buildings to be used as a nucleus for a menagerie. It was learned today that the first animal to be received in the Richmond Hill Zoo will be the famous puma, Teddy. This animal was brought from Brazil by Colonel Theodore Robertson and was presented to Queen's. There will also be a herd of elk, five in number; a herd of mountain deer, plain red deer and angora goats. It was stated at the Park Commissioner's office also that there is on an anodid, that kind of speculation as to just what name cannot be found in the dictionary. The inclosure now being made for the reception of the animals contains about 1,000 square feet, and there will be shelters for the animals and for the keepers.

LONDON TEACHERS START ON TOURS

LONDON, July 23.—With the closing down of the London schools today hundreds of teachers are starting out on extensive tours. The London Teachers' Association has organized a trip to Panama, whither fifty-two teachers sailed on Tuesday the round trip costing them only \$180 each. One month, the usual primary school holiday, being insufficient, the county council granted the members of the party six weeks on the grounds of the educational value of the tour. This action drew much comment from teachers taking shorter trips. Under the auspices of the National union of teachers a party sails for Canada tomorrow by the Alaudia. Frank C. Goldstone, and J. H. Thomson, labor members, are accompanying them. The party of Canadian teachers who recently arrived in England, have just reached London.
