SPORTING NEWS

GREAT RACING ON ICE YESTERDAY

The best track, the best weather and the largest attendance were the features of yesterday's racing on the Charlottetown Driving Club's race-course on Hillsborough Bay. There were three races on the card, which were pulled off in quick time by the capable officials who handled the meeting. The first race was the Free-for-all, in which there were two entries, Princess Etta, owned by Mr. T. C. Edgett, of this city, and Helen R., owned by Mr. D. A. McKinnon. The race was won in straight heats by Princess Etta, the heats averaging better than 1.5. This is splendid time and is an indication of the class which this mare shows. Helen R. was thought by many to be unbeatable by any horse in the Maritime Provinces at this distance, but Etta did the trick yesterday, and Mr. Edgett is being warmly complimented by his many friends on having such a valuable prospect. Mr. P. J. Conroy handled the ribbons and showed his usual good skill. The "green" race was one of the liveliest of the events so far, eight horses participating. Great interest was taken in this race on account of the different sections of the country represented. A syndicate of out-of-town sports brought in a dark horse with which they expected to spring a surprise on the boys. They very nearly did it, winning second money. Belmont Miller won the race in straight heats. He is a four-year-old pacer which shows a lot of speed. He was well driven by Mr. Charles Snow, who has been training him for the past few weeks. The match race between Home Guard, owned by Mr. David Livingston of this city, Lady Della, owned by Mr. Essory of Union Road, and Ruth H., owned by Mr. Abbott of the same locality, was also an interesting feature of yesterday's races. It was a split-up affair, ending in victory for Ruth H. on her Summary.

People were loud in their appreciation of the selection of the present ice course, owing to its nearness to the city and its comparative warmth. The officials of the Association have gone to quite a lot of trouble preparing the track, etc., in order to provide a sport to entertain the winter. The idea is to pull off as many races as possible while the ice is in good condition as it is very difficult to clear it when it becomes covered with snow.

The officials of the meeting were: Starter, Mr. G. McDonald; Judges, Messrs Jos. Crabe, Frank Hughes and Alfred Wood; timers, Mr. P. S. Brown, President of the C.D.C., and Mr. Chas. Thorne, Secretary C.D.C. One of the hardest worked officials of the C.D.C. is the secretary, who is getting considerable praise for the excellent interest he is taking in the Association.

STEAMER MONGOLIAN NOT BADLY DAMAGED

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Feb. 9.—The Allan liner Mongolian, which arrived here on Sunday leaking from contact with ice, is less seriously damaged than was at first supposed. She will effect temporary repairs, and sail again on Friday. The Colonial Government has decided that the first Newfoundland Regiment originally recruited 500 strong, and subsequently increased to 1000, all of whom have now been enlisted, shall be further augmented to 1,200, the enlistment for which now begins. The First Contingent, of 500 is now at Port George, Scotland, and the Second Contingent is being equipped for despatch. The Third Contingent will follow in the early spring. This will enable the Colony to maintain a full Battalion of 1000 strong in the field, and give thirty per cent. reinforcements.

TETANUS GERMS MENACE GERMANS.

LILLE, France, Feb. 8.—The German army surgeons have held a conference here relative to tetanus, which has become very prevalent among the German wounded. Papers were read to show that the earth in this region is infected with the tetanus germ, an in Upper Alsace, and that even the slightest contact of wounds with the earth is dangerous. The city itself was occupied by the Russians on September 4, 1914.

AN "INCIDENT" BROUGHT TO AN END.

PARIS, February 10.—The incident between Italy and Turkey growing out of the forcible seizure by the Turks of George Alexander Richardson, British consul at Hodeida, Arabia, while he was a refugee in the Italian consulate at Hodeida, probably was ended today, according to a despatch to the Havas Agency. Mr Richardson was brought today before the Italian consulate in Hodeida, says the despatch. The Italian flag was flying over the building, and the Turkish authorities rendered honors to it. Mr Richardson then left on the auxiliary cruiser Empress of India. The correspondent adds that cordial relations now exist between the Italian consulate and the local authorities of Hodeida.

GRAND CROSS FOR GENERAL JOFFRE

PARIS, Feb. 10.—A semi-official statement issued this afternoon says: "During the course of a recent meeting, His Majesty King Albert of Belgium bestowed upon General Joffre the insignia of the Grand Cross of the Order of Leopold. "In expressing to the King of Belgium his warm appreciation of this high distinction, General Joffre thanked His Majesty for this new evidence which he thus desired to show to the French army in the person of its chief, and which would strengthen still further the bonds uniting the two allied armies."

GOVERNMENT LIKELY TO ACQUIRE INTERNATIONAL

OTTAWA, Feb. 9.—The Government is likely to acquire as a branch line the International Railway of New Brunswick, extending from Campbellton on the International across the Province to St. Leonard's, on the St. John River.

The line has been operated under lease and at the coming session of the New Brunswick Legislature, the company will seek authority to convey the property to the Dominion Government. This presumably forecloses an outright acquisition.
