

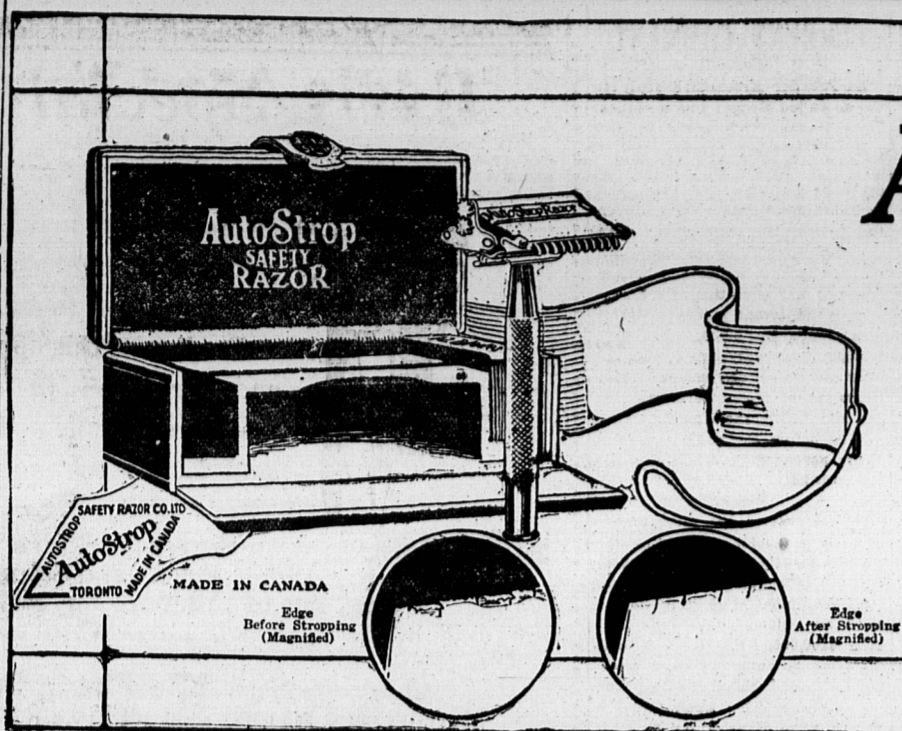

KING'S BIRTHDAY.—The following telegram has been received by His Honor, the Lieutenant Governor: "It is His Majesty's wish that His birthday should be celebrated on third June in overseas Dominions, Colonies and Protectorates, the nature of the ceremonies to be observed will be left to decision of King's representative and the inhabitants but His Majesty does not wish any unnecessary expense to be incurred. The celebration of His Majesty's Birthday in the United Kingdom will be observed on the fifth June. Thomas Mulvey, Under Secretary of State." Upon receipt of the above telegram His Honor, the Lieutenant Governor, in consultation with the Premier and His Worship the Mayor, and it was decided to request all citizens to fly their flags on that day. The day will also be observed in the schools by suitable programs.

The ranch of John Betz in Quebec was raided some weeks ago, and some foxes stolen. The disturbance created by the robbers caused many females to take fright and kill their young. Mr. Betz has the police working on the case. His loss is estimated at \$30,000.

Owing to the mild weather of the past few days many females who were having litters are forsaking their dens and digging holes in the ground where they take their litters. This is quite safe as long as there is not a rain storm.

One of the very best foods for young foxes is shredded wheat. This should be soaked overnight in water and then mixed with the milk in the morning. It can be purchased in bags at about eight cents a pound.

The fact that your fox pups are large and apparently healthy is no indication that they are entirely free from worms. It is better to be on the safe side and dose them.

As the summer is approaching extra precautions should be taken against the appearance of distemper. Stray dogs or dogs which roam about should not be allowed in the vicinity of the ranch. Dog distemper is very prevalent in the summer months and it is of the same species as fox distemper.

The fur industry dates back in Canada to the early French traders in the sixteenth century. Some body with a genius for statistics should look back a few hundred years and find out the production of silver black foxes in the wilds at that time. The Hudson Bay Company have a record of their sales for over two hundred years.

G. W. V. A. REPLIES TO HON. MR. COX.

Sir:—We are directed to state that in the issue of the Guardian of Thursday, May 20th, under proceedings in Legislature, the Hon. R. N. Cox subjected this Association and the returned men of the province to an uncalled for attack.

Mr. Cox, constituting himself a committee of one, moved, seconded and unanimously passed a severe vote of censure, stating that the returned men of the Province and the G. W. V. A. show but little interest in what is being done for them.

We are quite ready to concede to Mr. Cox the position of jester and fun provoker in the Legislature. As Chou Chin Chow, he is perfect. When hearing him speak, one can not but feel relieved that there are twenty-nine other members in the House.

Mr. Cox approached this Association on only one occasion and requested that we recommend a returned man for the position of lighthouse keeper at St. Peter's, stating that the present keeper was getting too old, and it was time a younger man took his place. Mr. Cox was told that this Association has never advocated the dismissal of public servants to make positions for returned men. We felt that this request from Mr. Cox is purely a political scheme, using this organization as the means thereto.

The Hon. member from Morell should realize that as a public man he must endeavor to state facts, and not fallacies. We are, Sir, &c.

Battle Royal In Virginia Town

(Dom. Press Special.) MATEWAN, V. A., May 120.—With at least 40 dead and many wounded this town was quiet this morning when the first detachment of state police arrived to take charge following last night's battle between miners and operatives of Baldwin Felts' detective agency. Eviction of miners from their homes by detectives cause the battle. The dead include several detectives, Mayor Caball Testaman, and two miners.

Principal Mackinnon At Rotary Club

There was a large attendance at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday afternoon in the Hotel Davies. Hon. A. E. Arsenault presided, and among the visitors were, Principal Clarence MacKinnon, Pine Hill, Dr. Houston, Charlottetown, Harry D. McLean, M. L. A., Professor Theodore Ross, Mr. J. A. Robertson, Captain A. A. Campbell, Rotarian John Doane, Montreal, Mr. J. H. Malcom, Mr. J. P. Gordon, Mr. P. S. Bradley, Mr. A. F. Webster. Early in the proceedings "the stork" appeared, and Rotarian Consul Pierce in a happy speech presented the Rotary Club to the chairman on the occasion of the advent of a daughter in his family.

Professor MacKinnon was then called upon for an address, and gave an inspiring message on the great opportunities that lie before us if we shall rise to the occasion and take advantage of them. He referred to the kind feeling and amity existing between the British, French and Americans, and said nothing should be done wantonly to jeopardize these friendly relations.

The speaker then turned upon them, and so long as our memories recall the white crosses in Flanders Fields, our lots were sealed together. It was necessary to cultivate the spirit of amity to bind these peoples together, and by these means save democracy, and save the world. In Europe, warfare and the means of warfare had been relegated to the past, and already they had realized that the conflict of today and for the future was a battle of intellects.

He wished the Canadians would realize the value that peoples in the old country and Europe see in the development of the intellect. He had some good book stores here, but he had yet to realize the meaning bookstores had to the peoples in the old country and Europe. In Canada the price of books was considerably higher than in Europe, and people did not read so deeply here as they did there. He had asked a high official in the C. P. R. why it was they had so few books for sale on the railway train, and the answer charged so high at \$2 and \$3. The official replied that people did not want to read books in the train. All they wanted were illustrated papers and magazines, that satisfied them. It was quite different in Germany for instance. They had bookstores at every street corner, and you could get the best of literature for a few pence. The people delighted in reading the best books, and these were within easy reach of the poorest lad. Similarly in Great Britain, every railway station had a bookstore having on sale the best literature. You could get classics for seven pence halfpenny, one shilling and one shilling and six pence, and these had large sales amongst all classes of people. The trouble was that the illustrated magazines, to look at the pictures and to cast them aside sometimes unread.

Something ought to be done to cultivate a taste for good literature, and the best and easiest way was to develop a taste in the rising generation. In Great Britain the education system was very much more advanced than here, and now attendance at school was compulsory up to the age of 18. They paid their teachers well. They had advanced their salaries to such an extent that the teaching profession now drew to it the best brains, so much so, that men were becoming teachers in preference to entering the Church. People realized fully that in coming days there was going to be a conflict of the world, and Great Britain must be prepared. One of the great characteristics of the people of the old land was their realization of the vision of the future, and the preparation they made in connection therewith. Nothing was too good in order to provide for and qualify the men who were to shoulder the burden of empire in the future. An instance of this was the manner in which the British government handled the wheat situation in the beginning of the war. They realized that the people must be fed, and so they entered into a contract with Canada to buy wheat at \$3 per bushel, and resold it to the

bakers for \$1.20 per bushel; and bought cheese at a similar loss. In order that the brawn and sinew of the rising generation, and the workers in the industries of the country, might be adequately provided for. They now realize that the next conflict is one of intellects, and if the British Empire is to maintain its control of the world, they realized it must be through education. This it is they are making the necessary arrangements to have their teachers well paid and their children well educated. They look far ahead these people, and make their plans accordingly. Why should we in Canada not follow suit? We have many advantages, and especially in these Maritime Provinces; we have got colleges and educational institutions second to none, and he could safely say that there is no preparatory school in the Maritime Provinces to compare with Prince of Wales College. The people of this Province appreciate the advantages of education, and when they go abroad attain to the foremost places, wherever they locate. Very seldom did an Islander fail abroad. But there was now a risk of the necessary education being neglected, in the case of the rising generation, not only here but throughout Canada as a whole, and it was desirable we should get together in order to provide the means for a scientific education so essential to put us in the forefront of the world. It should not be necessary as it is at present, in many instances to send abroad men to fill the most prominent positions in our industrial life. Had he time at his disposal, he should have liked to have dealt with the necessity of a Canadian consciousness, so strong, so powerful, and so intense, that we could put our confidence in it, and say we have something invisible and intangible with which to inspire us, and enable us to go forward and occupy the place which was ours if we realized our true place in the world. With such a consciousness, and with the unlimited resources at our command, there could not be but a great future for this land and people of ours.
