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MR. KING DECIDES TO GO TO LONDON

Important That Canada be Represented at the Imperial Conference.

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, Sept. 22.—From an authoritative source it is learned today that Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King has every intention of attending the Imperial Conference in London in spite of the strenuous campaign through which he has just passed.

Mr. King has, it is learned definitely, decided that affairs at home can be carried on satisfactorily for the comparatively brief period of his absence. He realizes the importance of his participation in the conference and is prepared to make such arrangements as are necessary to permit of his absence from Canada.

110 Bodies Recovered

SEBUNG, Fla., Sept. 22.—One hundred and ten bodies have been recovered at Morehaven and at least 200 more are rapidly decomposing. Colonel S. L. Lowery, Jr., of Tampa, who took control of the region today, told the Associated Press tonight upon his return from Morehaven.

Trouble Feared in Spanish Province

LONDON, Sept. 22.—The correspondent of the Daily Express at Cerberre, France, says he learns from Barcelona, Spain, that all posts of the civil guards in Barcelona and suburbs have been doubled and that provincial army garrisons have been placed under the supervision of the civil guards. He adds that the provincial government is strongly guarded and that a coup d'etat is feared.

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Engaged to Princess Astrid

(Canadian Press) BRUSSELS, Belgium, Sept. 21.—The engagement of Crown Prince Leopold, 24 year old Belgian heir-apparent, to Princess Astrid of Sweden, 20, third daughter of the Duke of Vaerstergotland and niece of King Gustav, was officially announced today.

The reason given being the objection to placing too great a preponderance of major portfolios with one province, and also Mr. Veniot's insistence upon a more important portfolio than that of secretary of state.

French Government Expresses Regret

ROME, Sept. 22.—The French Government has conveyed to Premier Mussolini its great regret at the recent incidents at Bastia, Corsica, where crowds attacked the Italian Consulate and obliged Italian ships in the harbor to hoist the French flag.

Ships Are Freed

QUEBEC, Sept. 22.—Two steamers which grounded yesterday in the St. Lawrence freed themselves and today were proceeding up river under their own steam. They are the Manchester Spinner and the Storfjord. The Spinner touched at Orignaux Point while en route from Sydney to Montreal with coal. The Storfjord went aground off Cape Chat 242 miles below Quebec on the north shore. She is proceeding to Three Rivers.

Financier Kills Wife and Two Young Sons

(Canadian Press) WARSAW, Poland, Sept. 22.—Edmund Statkiewicz, former director of the credit department of the finance ministry, and a director of a branch of the Bank of Poland, today shot and killed his wife and two young sons and later hanged himself in a doorway in his home.

Application For Injunctions To Proceed

(Canadian Press) PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 22.—Common Pleas court number one this afternoon denied a motion to postpone argument on the application of B. C. Clements of the Chicago Coliseum Club for injunctions to stop the Jack Dempsey — Gene Tunney fight here tomorrow night.

Orleans Duchess Is Cut Off In Will

LONDON, Sept. 22.—Philip, fourth Duke of Orleans, and Bourbon pretender to the French throne, who died at Palermo last March, left a remarkable will which was made public here today. He cut off his wife, who was the Archduchess Maria Dorothea, for the Austrian Royal House, with nothing in a savage codicil.

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DEATH LIST ESTIMATED AT TWO HUNDRED

(Canadian Press) ASCUNSION, Paraguay, Sept. 22.—The death list in the hurricane which struck the city of Encarnacion Monday night continues to grow. With exact figures still lacking official reports estimate the dead at 200 while other sources said it will reach 500.

South American City Struck by Hurricane

(Canadian Press) ASCUNSION, Paraguay, Sept. 22.—A hurricane struck this city last night killing about 150 persons, injuring 500 others and causing damage estimated at \$1,000,000. The lower part of the city was completely wiped out and a number of districts in the harbor were captured.

British Yacht Abandoned in Sinking Condition

(Canadian Press) BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 22.—The British Yacht Mary O'Connor had been abandoned today in a sinking condition thirty miles south of Cape Sable. The crew of six was picked up by the Dutch steamer Jacatra of the Rotterdam-Lloyd line bound for Boston from Batavia and other Dutch East India ports.

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35 Airplanes Lost in Storm

McCoskey to Be Hanged Nov. 26

(Canadian Press) KINGSTON, Sept. 22.—Thomas McCoskey, convict K 994, a Portmouth penitentiary inmate, was found guilty of murdering Earl Jenkins, guard of the penitentiary on August 23, by a jury under Mr. Justice Logie here this afternoon, and sentenced to be hanged on November 26.

NEW GOVT. WILL BE IN POWER BY WEEKEND

A Meeting of the Cabinet Council Will be Held This Morning Following Which Resignation of Govt. May be Announced.
