Higgs that the Council of the Board of Trade discuss the matter with the water commission Mr. R. E. Mutch suggested that the president and the secretary of the Board meet the chairman of the commission to arrange a meeting. A motion to this effect was introduced by Mr. Jas. Paton and seconded by Mr. T. E. McNutt.

The matter of retaining a local radio station and of compensating the stations for giving up their business was introduced by Mr. S. A. McDonald. In the report of the Royal Commission, the latter phase had been provided for, but Mr. Keith Rogers had stated that in addition to remunerating for the physical assets, an additional amount should be paid in view of the good will gained by a station. According to the report it will be possible to build stations wherever necessary, besides those designed for the five economic areas. Of the latter one consists of the three Maritime Provinces with a station at Moncton.

Mr. Jas. Paton, who is to represent the province at the meeting of the Federated Chambers of Commerce of the British Empire in London this year, stated that he has been in communication with Mr. Clark of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

try which had presented the Kellogg Pact to the nations of the world could finally refuse to accept the compulsory jurisdiction of the Permanent International Court.

Mr. Lapointe spoke at considerable length in an explanatory way, reviewing the history of the steps taken to date and discussing the scope and nature of the jurisdiction involved. The motion passed without division.

Several Government bills were advanced a stage, including the bill to ratify the agreement with Saskatchewan in respect of the transfer of natural resources. The matter of referring the question of compensation to the courts would not delay the transfer of the resources which would be handed over immediately.

An important statement was made by the Hon. Mr. Cardin in reference to the report of the Royal Commission on radio. He stated that no action would be taken until the report of the committee to consider it had been received. The licenses in existence would require to be renewed as from April 1st. It is generally understood, however, that the Government will take no action this season, as the questions involved are very contentious and it is safer for political reasons to shelve them until after the general elections.

The Prime Minister announced that after the Easter recess he would make a statement as the result of conferences on water powers in the St. Lawrence, as affecting Ontario and Quebec, which would be final and clear the way for taking up the whole question of the St. Lawrence waterways. The House sat tonight for the first time on Wednesday this session. It will not sit on Friday night, however.

NO PERFECT STENOGRAPHER LONDON, April, 8. - (British United Press) - There is no such thing as the ideal typist. This is one of the conclusions at which Dr. W. J. Pinard has arrived after testing more than 300 stenographers on behalf of the National Institute of Industrial Psychology.

Dr. Pinard's tests are simple. For instance, he asks them to draw a number of "S's" first the right way round, and then reversed. If they can afterwards write these "S's" alternately, with both accuracy and speed, they are adaptable, or, as he prefers to call it, "non-perseverant." If they cannot do so, they are classified as "perseverant."

The "perseverant," it appears, is slightly faster, but she works only at her own speed, and is of a melancholic and suspicious nature. Her non-perseverant sister, on the other hand, is ideal for purposes of dictation, for she can work at any speed, but she is peevish and subject to moods and hysteria.

Passion Week In St. James

The observance of Easter as the Great Lord's Day, the Queen of Festivals, has re-established itself so generally that no pleading or apology for its observance is now required. Nevertheless the full joy of Easter cannot be entered into, and its celebration cannot but remain more or less superficial unless some preparation be made for it. This is realized by those congregations in which the helpful custom obtains to set apart the week preceding Easter, the Holy Week, to devout meditation upon the sorrows of the Man of Sorrows, and to the fulfillment of a series of special services which follow in orderly sequence the footsteps of His bitter Passion and tread again with adoration the awful Way of the Cross.

In accordance with the resolution of the Session of St. James, Holy Communion will be celebrated at the morning service on Sunday, and at the evening service the subject will be "Christ's Triumphant Entrance into Jerusalem." This will begin the week of special services which will continue every night during the week at 8 p. m. On Good Friday there will be two services, one at 3 p. m. and the other at 8 p. m. telling again the old, old story of Jesus and His love.

On Easter Sunday there will be two diets of worship at the usual hours when special Easter hymns and anthems will be sung, and the glad message pealed forth in joyful strains "Christ the Lord is Risen Today." May I therefore appeal to all the members and adherents of St. James amid the multiplicity of their other engagements, to try their best, (even should it involve a little sacrifice), to attend these services.

We are exceedingly fortunate in having as our acting Minister the Rev. Mr. Legate, whose preaching of the eternal verities in the power of "the faith once for all delivered to the saints," is well known throughout the Presbyterian Church. As a chaplain in the great war, he had the distinguished honour of entering Jerusalem with General Allenby; so he is doubly well qualified to deal with those immortal scenes which changed the course of the world's history and will to all time, be associated with the Passion of our blessed Lord. A cordial welcome is extended to all who may have the desire to attend any or all of these services.
