Then, we should have little or no disorganization or disintegration of our economic, industrial and commercial life, no staggering war debts, no excuses for sedition, slackness, outrage or treason. National envy and jealousy would have no soil for their menacing development and revolution would be without the passion which engenders it. We should all hope and pray that the wonderful example of Canada and the United States living side by side in peace, harmony, contentment and mutual freedom will spread to the other nations of the world and become one of their national dogmas as it has ours. (Applause.)

Our Contribution. Roman civilization left a heritage to the world in her laws; Greece gave her letters to the world, and so, may it be said of our era and civilization, that our contribution to the world's progress was a spirit of universal service. We should believe in the "live and let live" ideal. No garden of flowers is perfect or complete without the presence of the rose or the orchid, the violet or the lily, and, indeed, of every kind of flower of tenderness and beauty. Nor can the garden of international life be perfectly complete without the presence and preservation of all the fine types of intellect and spirit that have come from the trials and sufferings, the struggles and sacrifices of the various peoples. Civilization would certainly be made imperfect by the loss of any one of the essential elements, the varying attributes and excellencies of all human life. And so let us all be advocates, as I am sure this Society is, of a brotherly love between nations, and firm believers that we are all needed, every nation. In the up-building of a Christian civilization, as called for by the Founder of Universal Service and Helpfulness and His great Apostle, St. Andrew, whom we are honoring tonight.

His Worship Mayor Jenkins. He gave an interesting review of the progress made by the city since its incorporation in 1855 with Robert Hutcheson as its first mayor. in their houses in the old times for fire protection, and when fighting the fire these were passed along full from man to man and so on. Until 1877 things moved along in a haphazard fashion. Then J. S. Carvell became Mayor and he made a long report to the City Council recommending how the city might be improved especially along the line of civic book-keeping. He wrote that in 1870 the officer kept all the accounts in an Almanac for that particular year. In 1923, only \$24.89 was expended for permanent work. Since 1914 - \$459,000 has been expended. His Worship also spoke of our excellent waterworks system, pumping last year 464,000,000 gallons, electric light system, hotels, stores, churches, public buildings, etc. Among the future needs of the city he mentioned, a civic motor, a real civic spirit, a more adequate system for the disposal of garbage, supervised playgrounds, detention home for delinquent boys, and a clearing house for all charity.
