## Lombardi And Frey Big Question Marks In Cincinnati's Series Chances

CINCINNATI, Sept. 30 (AP)—The tidal wave of another World Series washed over the Queen City today, beaching baseball's notable players and lifting the populace into a high state of excitement in advance of Wednesday's first game between Detroit Tigers and Cincinnati Reds.

The big question today was whether or not the Reds' injured regulars, Catcher Ernie Lombardi and Second Baseman Lonnie Frey, would be able to play. Not even Manager Bill McKechnie knew the answer.

The Tigers already have been established favorites at 7 to 10 and the crippled condition of the Cincinnati team made it likely that the odds against the Reds would strengthen.

Tickets still were a frantic prob-

lem for some fans, intent on seeing the extravaganza get under way at 2:30 p.m. A.S.T. Wednesday.

Crosley Field was certain to be jammed to its capacity of about 33,000.

Not until then are the probable pitchers likely to become known. Managers McKechnie and Del Baker have committed themselves only to Paul Derringer and Buck Newsom and Schoolboy Rowe for Detroit in the first two games—orders as yet undecided.

Derringer, a 20 and 12 winner during the regular season, was the Reds' most likely choice for the opener. He threw curves which the Detroit dynamiters may find troublesome.

Rowe gained an edge over Newsom in the guessing for the Tigers' No. 1 man because of his standing. His season record is 16 won and 3 lost.

## Cinderella Champs Leave For Cincy

DETROIT, Sept. 30 (AP)—Detroit Tigers, Cinderella champions of the American Baseball League, left today for Cincinnati to open the World Series Wednesday with the National League Champion Reds. The team started off in top physical condition.

As the club set out after its first world championship since 1935, Manager Del Baker, recovering from a cold that kept him from directing the Tigers in their game at Cleveland Sunday, remained undecided whether Lynwood (Schoolboy) Rowe or Buck Newsom would be first to face the Reds.

This pair of right handers led the Tigers in the pennant campaign, Newsom winning 21 games and losing four and Rowe winning 16 and losing three.

After games in Cincinnati Wednesday and Thursday the Tigers will return to Detroit Friday morning. The series schedule calls for games here Friday, Saturday, and if necessary, Sunday.

Satisfied with the pitching that netted the league pennant, Tiger fans pin their chief hopes on their favorites' batting power, especially as represented in the "home run twins," Hank Greenberg and Rudy York.

## U.S.L.T. Assn. Objects To 'Open Tourneys'

NEW YORK, Sept. 30 (AP)—The United States Lawn Tennis Association, repeating its long-standing objections to "open tournaments," announced today it had no intention of building up a "new tennis tide" in which a professional player, if he won, could capitalize for his personal profit.

In an association of "service bulletin," issued over the signature of President Helcombe Ward, the governing body of amateur tennis said that the International Federation bars open tournaments, and added that while there is no rule against team matches between amateurs and pros, these would "injure amateur tennis" by introduction of the "individual profit motive" into the game.

"By permitting pros to make a practice of playing matches against amateurs," the bulletin read, "we would be building up the professional game to the detriment of the amateur game."

The Association added it was looking forward to the day when "strong professional association will exercise jurisdiction over all tennis pros."

## Canadian Dollar Drops, Free Pound Climbs To High

NEW YORK, Sept. 30 (CP)—The Canadian dollar dropped 1 1/2 cents on the foreign exchange market today while the Swiss franc and the free pound sterling climbed to the top prices for the year.

The Swiss currency gained 1-20 cent to 22.95 cents, influenced by rumors that the bank for international settlements might return to Basel, Switzerland, because of lessened war tension in the neutral nation.

Free sterling advanced 1 1/4 cents to \$4.05 in relation to the United States dollar. The Canadian money closed at a discount of 14 1/2 per cent after gaining around four cents last week. (Ottawa foreign exchange control board rate 9.09-9.91 per cent discount.)

The Hong Kong and Shanghai dollars and the Argentine peso also gained fractions.

Hill, paymaster for the Western Region, Canadian National Railways, retires under the superannuation rules of the company today. His official record lists 36 years of railway service, but the first four years were devoted in clerical work in Montreal and Winnipeg. Mr. Hill commenced his railway work as a clerk in Montreal in 1904 with the Grand Trunk Railway audit department.

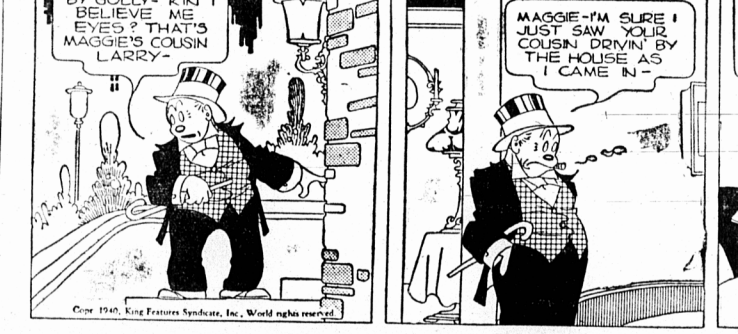
