The High Cost of Living

THE Government Commission has reported—their 2000 pp. document was tabled in the House of Commons on February the 18th.

The Commission finds that there are nine reasons why the cost of living has advanced, and these reasons are detailed.

The amount of the increase in the cost of living amounts to about fifty per cent. in the last fifteen years.

Where one dollar was needed in the old days, a dollar and a half is needed now; where a two thousand dollar salary was required then a three thousand dollar salary is needed now.

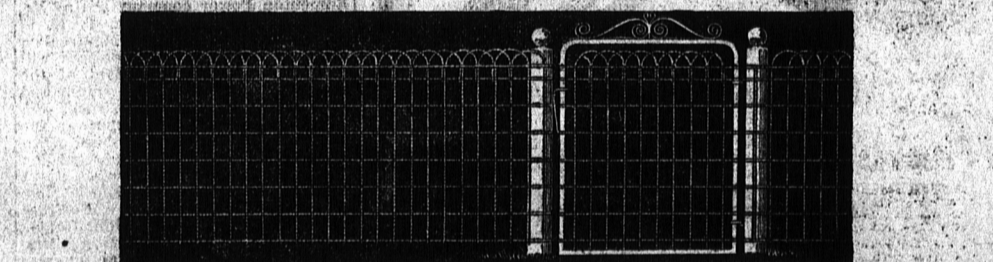

having entered the industry in too large a way before the methods and precautions necessary were under-
stood. The loss in labor may have
been great and discouragement re-
sulted. It should be started in a small
way in order that the outlay is almost
negligible and the amount under ber-
ries increased gradually until a maxi-
mum for the farm is reached whether
it be 1/2, 1, 2 or 3 acres. In this way
the markets can also be gradually de-
veloped.
Many are depending a good deal up-
on one or two particular phases of
their farm production for their income
and occasionally one may fail. Would
it not be a good experiment to add an-
other channel for income? Many fam-
ilies can do all their own picking,
packing, wedding, planting, etc., for a
reasonable area and it is doubtful if
any other feature of farm production
will repay in such a satisfactory way
if properly managed.
The Provincial Department of Agri-
culture under the Federal Grant is
prepared to give assistance by advis-
