## Contract Bridge

### AN UNUSUAL TYPE

In some cases the need for a throw-in play is apparent the moment dummy is spread; but at other times the possible value of this play is not nearly so well marked. Consider today's deal.

North dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

♠ 10 9 8  
♥ Q J 5 3  
♦ A 9 6 4  
♣ 5 2  
K Q 10

10 8 6 4  
Q 8 7 3  
A K J 7 6 5

The bidding:

North East South West  
Pass Pass 4NT Pass  
5♦ Pass 6♣ Pass  
Pass Pass

In view of North's original pass, South was rather optimistic when he tried for the slam. However, he found his partner with precisely the right cards and distribution, and therefore should have capitalized his own good fortune in this respect. West led the heart king. South won, laid down the ace and king of trumps, then obviously gaily satisfied with his prospects, led the diamond deuce to dummy's jack. East won with the blank ace and, rather than lead from his club king into an unknown position, returned a heart. Dummy ruffed, of course, but declarer soon found that he was doomed to lose another diamond trick!

It is true that declarer could have made the hand very easily by leading a low diamond from dummy, thus knocking out East's blank ace without sacrificing an honor. This, however, was a sheer guess, i.e., there was as much chance that the diamond ace lay blank in West's hand as in East's. The correct line of play was to eliminate all the clubs and hearts in the North-South hands by cross-ruffing with high trumps, then to draw the outstanding trumps and finally to lead the diamond. With this plan, a blank ace in either East or West would not matter, because the defenders would have to return a side suit that would let South discard a diamond while he ruffed in the opposite hand.
