## Tignish Native Dies at Sydney

SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 29.—(CP)—A well known resident of this city for more than a decade and a native Tignish P.E.I., Mrs. Calvin MacLellan, died at her home early today following a short illness. She was 61.

She was the former Mary Ann MacDonald of the Prince Edward Island community. She is survived by her husband, two daughters and four sons. They are Mrs. A. J. MacQueen, Antigonish, N. S.; Kathleen, Clarence, Percy, Edward and Roy MacPadden, all of Sydney.

One sister, Mrs. George Ferguson, Sunny Brie, N. B., and three brothers, Charles and John MacDonald, in Prince Edward Island and Dan MacDonald, in Maine, also survive.

Funeral arrangements were not complete immediately.

## Effect of R. A. F. Bombers revealed From French source

PARIS, (via Berlin), Nov. 28.—(Delayed)—The Le Havre newspaper "Eclair" has disclosed in an article authorized by the German authorities the wide extent of the damage caused to ports and industrial areas during British bombing since Sept. 14.

The article continued almost minutely, the newspaper said, the Havre population, the article claimed, has fled to the heights surrounding the seaport, where some have sought refuge from friends and guests in the railroad tunnels and flats.

There was no mention of damage to harbors, since such a matter would be a military secret, the newspaper did say, however, the article has been showered with a number of times.

LONDON, Nov. 29.—(CP)—The Air Ministry told today of overnight bombing raids centred upon Avila, a town producing the submarines which have been proving upon British shipping.

The Ministry said that the submarine armament varies at Avila, developed here through the use of the Baltic Sea, and the U-boat engine factory at Mannheim were attacked.

A synthetic oil plant at Politz was also left in flames. Britain's long-distance bombers have raided Politz, on the Baltic, periodically, although it is a long, arduous flight from British bases.

The first bomber over Politz started fires immediately, the Ministry said, and an observer counted 12 other towns burnt, "as a result of his own bombing."

Attacks were made also on the channel ports of Antwerp, Boulogne and Havre.

## British Control of Mediterranean Demonstrated.

LONDON, Nov. 29.—(CP CABLE)—The offensive staged by the Mediterranean fleet nipped in the bud an attempt by the Italians to establish new lines of communication with their forces in North Africa. British naval experts suggested today.

These experts suggested that the Italian fleet was routed off Sardinia on Wednesday, with damage to six of the enemy warships, including a battleship, was attempted to patrol a new line of communication, perhaps using French territorial waters off Tunisia to reach Libya where Italian forces are offensive against Egypt. It has been stalled for a long time and apparently needs re-inforcements and supplies.

Apparently the Italians had not realized that Britain's hold on the Mediterranean had been so strengthened by the fleet air arm Tarranto Nov. 11 that a big force could be used to patrol the western Mediterranean as a separate naval entity.

It was evident from the Admiralty communique that the action off Sardinia that Vice Admiral Sir James Somerville has a big force under his command in the western end of the Mediterranean. His fleet is carried by H.M.S. Renown, 32,000-ton battleship, the commander in chief of the Mediterranean fleet, Sir Andrew Cunningham, has been operating further east of Greece. Italy proper and Egypt.

## Greek Freighter Reports Cmdr. Beard retired On sick leave

HALLFAX, Nov. 29.—(CP)—The British freighter *Uria* today rescued the whole crew of the storm-smashed Greek freighter *Lugena*. Cmdr. J. S. Macdonald, according to wireless advices reaching here tonight.

Battered for two days by an Atlantic gale, the *Lugena* remained aloft about 125 miles southwest of Newfoundland, leaking and helpless, and held to by her load of lumber. Another ship was held by her while a salvage vessel headed for her position.

The *Uria* reported the safety of all members of the crew of the Greek vessel, which first flashed S. O. S. signals three days ago, when she developed a leak through the hull, the height of a howling wind and snow storm.

Meanwhile, no further word came to land concerning the fate of the crew of the Canadian freighter *Lugena*, which fouled 400 miles off Newfoundland in the same storm. The *Norwegian* and *Frederic*, yesterday reported picking up a lifeboat loaded with men from the *Lugena*, and said she was searching for another.

Since then no messages from the *Norwegian* have been picked up. The Newfoundland Department of Public Utilities said tonight that no men had gone down with the *Lugena*, but this was not verified. Number of men saved was not known.

Of the 29 men in the *Lugena*'s crew, 27 lived in Canada. The vessel is a former French craft, taken over by the western German military stores near Mainz and airdromes at Koblenz and Eindhoven.

Two British aircraft were reported missing.

ST. THOMAS, Ont., Nov. 29.—(CP)—Premier Mitchell F. Heppburn of Ontario said in an interview at his home near tonight that there was no disagreement between Hon. Eric Cross and himself which led to Cross's resignation as minister of welfare and municipal affairs in the provincial government.

Informed of a Toronto telegram newspaper story saying the Premier and his former minister had disagreed over payment of an \$18,000 legal fee to Armand Racine, Windsor lawyer, for his services in connection with the refinancing of the municipal debt of Sandwich, Mr. Heppburn said the matter had not been discussed.
