SHEEP BREEDERS' MEETING.—An AO valuable meeting of the Sheep Breeders of St. Louis District was held at Palmer Road on Friday evening, Sept. 10th. During the past few years this district has become known for the large number of excellent lambs it has produced and the object of the meeting was to organize a co-operative association for the further promotion of sheep breeding. Upwards of seventy five breeders of sheep attended the meeting and entered into the discussions that took place with thoroughness. The Association will undertake to provide its members with pure bred blood for the improvement of the grade flocks. Upwards of fifteen Shropshire rams have already been ordered through the Agricultural branch at Summerside, to be placed before winter. The most valuable move of the Association will be to undertake the handling of lambs and wool for its members. Both these products have been handled by the members in a co-operative way in the past but undoubtedly the strengthening of their organization will aid in sheep industry of the district. Prof. W. J. Reid, of the Agricultural Branch, Summerside, and Father Gauthier were in charge of the meeting and assisted in the organization in many ways.

QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS

The qualification of voters for a

COUNCILLOR

to serve in the LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY are in substance as follows:—

Every Voter must be a male person of the age of twenty-one years, a British Subject, and not subject to any legal incapacity, and must own real estate of a freehold or leasehold tenure to the value of three hundred and twenty-five dollars, or must own land, partly freehold and partly leasehold, amounting together to the value of three hundred and twenty-five dollars, and must have owned or been in possession of the same for a period of at least six months previous to the teste of the Writ of Election.

A Mortgagor or c'estui qui trust in actual possession is an owner within the meaning of the above.

The Qualification of Voters for an

ASSEMBLYMAN

to serve in the LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY are in substance as follows:—

Every voter must be a male person of the age of twenty-one years, a British Subject, not subject to any legal incapacity, and must in addition be entitled to one or more of the following qualifications:—

FIRST.—Ownership for six months previous to the teste of the writ of freehold property of the value of not less than one hundred dollars consisting of a warehouse, shop or other building, or any farm or piece of land; or must be in the bona fide use and occupation or actual possession of any such last mentioned premises.

SECOND.—The payment or commutation by labor of all road taxes on or before the 31st December last or of all civic taxes for which the voter may have been liable, together with the receipt or certificate therefor, and a twelve months' residence in the Electoral District or being especially exempt therefrom by statute.

Persons who have come of age since the date or respective dates when, if of age, they would have been liable to pay civic poll tax or to perform statute labor or pay commutation money, shall if otherwise qualified, vote without the production of any receipt or certificate of payment or commutation of any road tax or of civic poll tax.

In addition, the voter must have resided in the Electoral District for twelve months before the teste of the writ of election.

Occasional absences from the Electoral District for a period not exceeding in all four months shall not disqualify such voter.

The time spent from home by fishermen and mariners in the pursuit of their usual avocation and by students attending institutes of learning shall be deemed and taken to be time spent at their respective homes or residences.

THIRD.—Every mortgagor or c'estui qui trust in actual possession for six months previous to the teste of the writ of real estate or dower land set off and reduced into possession and of the value of one hundred dollars.

FOURTH.—Every person exempt under this Act from the payment of civic poll tax or from the performance of statute labor, or payment of commutation money shall if otherwise qualified, be entitled to vote for an Assemblyman.

Willfully, falsely and corruptly swearing to any of the oaths prescribed by the Act, or procuring or suborning any persons so to do, is punishable with the pains and disabilities inflicted on persons guilty of wilful and corrupt perjury.

Persons who shall procure themselves to be polled out of the proper electoral division or polling district, shall forfeit sixteen dollars and their votes shall be struck out of the poll book.

Persons who shall procure themselves to be polled more than once at the same election for the same town or district, or who shall vote under a false or fictitious name or personate or vote in the name of any other person, or not being duly qualified to vote and be polled accordingly to law shall forfeit sixteen dollars for each offence.

Penalty for Defacing Proclamation or other Election Documents posted up

[Sec. 198 of "The Election Act 1913"]

Any person unlawfully taking down, covering up, mutilating, defacing or altering any proclamation, notice or other document required to be posted up under any of the provisions of this Act shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Fifty dollars and costs, and not less than Ten dollars and costs or, in default of payment of such fine and costs, to imprisonment for a term not exceeding two months and not less than one month with or without hard labor; and if the person so offending is a returning officer, election clerk, deputy returning officer, poll clerk or other officer engaged in the election, he shall be liable to a fine not exceeding One Hundred Dollars and costs and not less than Twenty Dollars and costs, or, in default of payment of such fine and costs, to imprisonment for a term not exceeding Six months and not less than two months with or without hard labor.

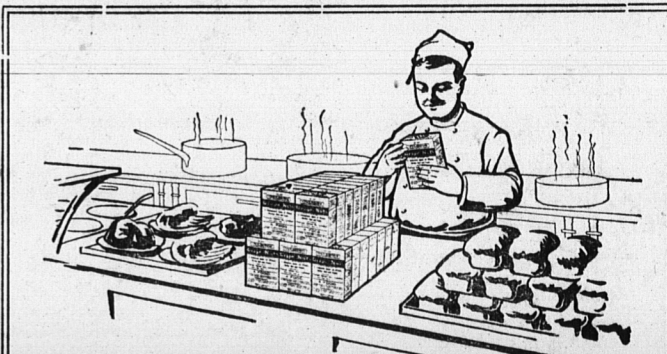
