QUALIFIED TENDERS addressed to the undersigned and marked "Tender for Addition to Airway Building at Charlottetown" will be received up to 12 o'clock noon, Thursday, October 31st, 1946, for the construction of an addition and alterations to the Airway Building at the Airport at Charlottetown, P. E. I.

Plans, specifications, labour conditions, form of contract and tender forms may be obtained on application to the General Purchasing Agent, Department of Transport, Ottawa, Ontario, or from the District Airway Engineer, Dominion Government Building, Montreal, N. B., upon receipt of an accepted cheque made payable to the Receiver General of Canada for the sum of \$10. This cheque will be returned upon the return of the plans and specifications in good condition.

Each tender must be accompanied by a certified cheque on a chartered Canadian bank equal to ten per cent (10%) of the tender price, payable to the order of the Receiver General of Canada, which cheque will be forfeited in the event of the tenderer refusing to enter into a contract on the basis of his tender, if called upon to do so, or failing to satisfactorily complete such a contract. Cheques of unsuccessful tenderers will be returned.

Any tender not accompanied by a security deposit as described will not be considered. The Department does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender.

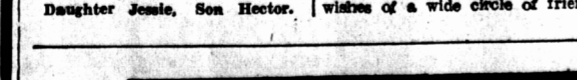
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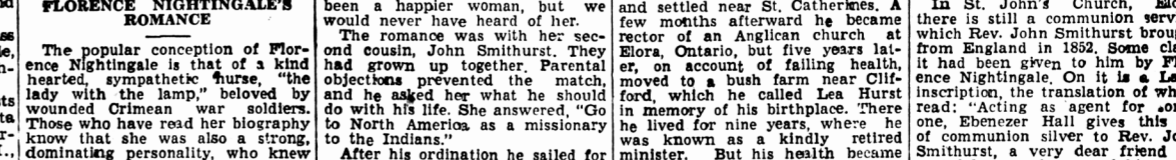
