Personnel Of Committee On Rehabilitation

A reconstruction committee to work with officials of the Dominion Government in formulating and working out the details of a land settlement scheme for veterans of the present war has been appointed by the Provincial Government. The personnel of the committee was announced yesterday by Premier Campbell.

The committee met yesterday morning in the House of Commons made for the attendance of a delegation at a conference to be held with Dominion officials in Saint John next week.

"I trust that before the close of the session," Premier Campbell stated, "it will be possible to have a report of the conference through that deliberation. From my knowledge of the programme as outlined, I am confident that it will be a most successful one, and that it will be available not only to farmers but to fishermen and other persons who desire small holdings."

The nature of the scheme," he added, "will not tend to leave the settler on his own resources and in the 'lurch' as was too often the case in the old land settlement scheme but it will give him every opportunity and encouragement to become a successful farmer and proper direction and supervision of the House of Commons." As the scheme develops, he said, it may be necessary to enlarge the committee.

Post-War Civil Aviation Problems
OTTAWA, March 10 (CP)—Reference to problems of post-war civil aviation have been made in frequent discussions which take place between officers of the Canadian Legion and the Canadian officers of the United States Department, said a reply tabled today by Howard Green (Prog. Con. Vancouver South).
No assurances have been asked or received from the United States Government that Canada will be kept informed of any agreements or negotiations between the United States and other countries relating to post-war aviation, the reply said.
The Canadian Government, however, assumes in view of the general nature of its relations with the United States Government, that the government will keep each other informed of important negotiations which are being conducted with other powers on the subject of post-war civil aviation.
