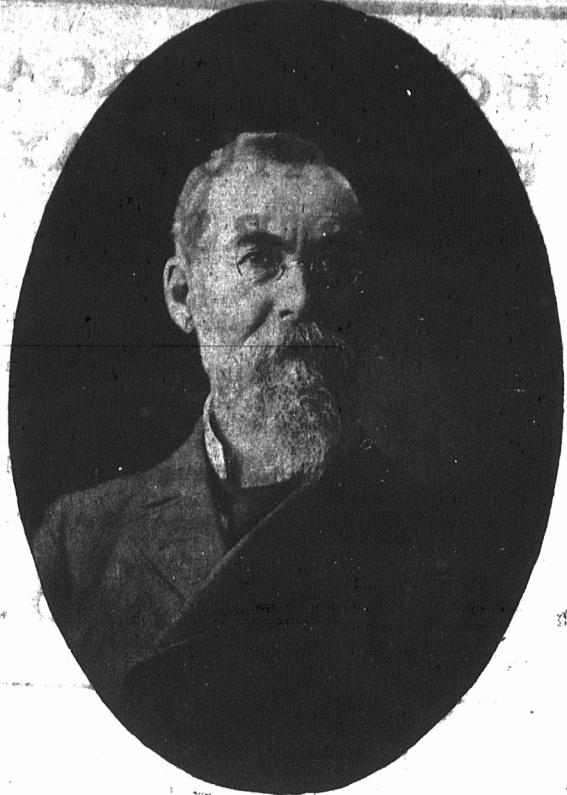

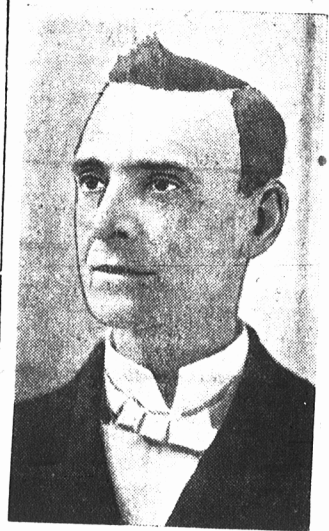


JAMES VROOM, ESQ., ST. STEPHEN.

REV. MR. DOBSON IN LOS ANGELES

A Speaker of Unusual Power, Says Exchange

A Resume of His Remarks to the Conference Conveying the Greetings of Canada to Convention.

The following is a clipping from the Los Angeles Times, of recent date, of the speech of Rev. Mr. Dobson who has been called to the First Methodist Church.

"From the Canadian Methodist church there also came greetings yesterday, borne by Rev. Dr. William Dobson of Windsor N. S. Mr. Dobson is a speaker of unusual powers and withal brilliant in expression and quite original in his utterances. He said that while Canada had furnished a graveyard for the Mother of Methodism it also furnished a fruitful field for the propagation of the principles taught by John Wesley.

"I am impressed with your same enthusiasm," continued Dr. Dobson. "The consecrated ability enlisted in the service of your church is sufficient to hold this nation to the teaching of the gospel of the cross; and to swing the indifferent masses in line for beneficent endeavor."

"On your northern boundary there is a great people with interests similar to your own. There the same aspirations prevail, the same aims actuate. Our institutions as yours have for their aim and object: the development of civilization. Nature has been most kind to us. Just back of our habitation to shelter us from the stormy blasts providence has set up a pall. I wish you might see it. There is nothing like it in the United States. Ours is indeed a great country. I am proud of it. I have been all over it and never yet have I heard a Canadian express a desire to force the United States to submit to annexation.

"To my mind the great question of the twentieth century is that of building up a civilization on an ethical basis in harmony with the teachings of the Sermon on the Mount. Canada is looking to the United States to lead in this great under-

taking. In this work I hope to have a part, and my attitude will be that of first a Christian, then a British subject; first a child of God, then a member of the Methodist, Episcopal church.

"You have questions to meet here that do not confront us across the border. We have no question of color, no Mormon horde with its peculiar propaganda. We have, however, one great evil to combat, common also to other lands—that is original sin. It breaks out in the liquor traffic, sweeping our strong manhood to destruction; in political corruption where men sell their souls for a mess of pottage and sometimes it breaks out in the church when men are pulling for places of honor and resorting to every trick of the politician to accomplish the desired end. This form of depravity is very bad in my country. I cannot believe that you are so troubled.

I bring you the greeting of my church and I am delighted to express to you something of our loving interest and desire for Christian fellowship. We in turn ask for a continuance in your affectionate consideration."

CH TOWN FARMERS MARKET

The supply of produce offering on the market for some time past has been limited. The prices being paid at present for potatoes and oats are not considered profitable enough to the farmer to stop his sowing operations to attend market. Potatoes which have ruled high—too high—for buyers to risk much money in so perishable a stock, and such like market have dropped to 35cts a bushel, and the present outlook points to lower figures. Oats are quite at 35cts for white, and 30cts for black. Hay keeps around 65 to 70 cts per 100 lbs. Eggs are still keeping up at the 12 cts per dozen rate, but with much larger supplies coming in, and the demand weakening, lower figures may soon be expected. There is no dressed pork offering. Live hogs, best lots are worth 6 cts per lb. Other market supplies are without change.

MILITIA ORDERS

Authorize Quite a Lot of Promotion on P. E. Island.

OTTAWA, May 23.—Latest militia orders authorize the formation of a cadet organization at Chatham, attached to the 73rd Northumberland Regiment, also a cadet organization connected with Prince of Wales College, P. E. I. Companies of the Prince Edward Island Regiment Artillery are numbered with headquarters as follows:

No. 1 to 4 at Charlottetown; No. 5 at Montague, and No. 6 at Souris. Formation of a rifle association in Bridgetown, N. S., is authorized. In the Prince Edward Island Light Horse, to be Lt. Sergeant, J. A. Stewart, to complete establishment 17th December, 1904; to be provisional Lt. Sgt. M. J. T. A. Ridd, Sgt. L. H. Beer, to complete establishment 17th December, 1904; 4th Prince Edward Island Regiment, to be provisional lieutenants: W. B. Prowse, J. A. Webster, D. A. McKinnon, F. E. Newson, J. E. Small, W. E. Cameron gentlemen to complete establishment 14th March, 1904; to be lieutenants (super-numeraries): J. A. S. Bayer, W. F. Collings, gentlemen, 14th March, 1904. A large list of confirmations of rank has been issued covering many maritime corps.

DERELICT SCHR. JAMES W.

Wednesday's New York Herald contains a miniature chart of the North Atlantic showing the drift of the derelict schooner James W. which was abandoned on a voyage to the West Indies from Halifax, lumber laden. The Herald says: From the frequency with which they have been encountering the same derelict officers of the steamship Palatia are beginning to think that the North Atlantic is a small sheet of water after all. This view of the western ocean has been brought about by a second meeting in May with a derelict which this vessel had met once before in February. The wreck, which is that of the schooner James W., was first seen by the Palatia on February 18. It was then about six hundred miles to the eastward of this port. Arriving from Hamburg yesterday the Palatia reported having again sighted the same wanderer, this time on May 11, and very near in mid-Atlantic. During these eighty-three days the derelict had drifted about one thousand miles. This is not very slow travelling even for a derelict. But the most remarkable feature of the report is that since the James W. became a derelict in the early part of the year the wreck has been reported only three times, twice by the Palatia and once by a vessel arriving out and which had sighted the wreck on March 27, and in a locality about three hundred and fifty miles to the north west of where it was last seen—Halifax Chronicle. The James W. is well known here and was owned by Carvell Bros. and Capt. Murchison of this city.

ROMANTIC MARRIAGE.

PARIS, May 20.—A romantic marriage was celebrated recently at Tournon, in the department of Puy-de-Dome, when the Marquise Eleonore de Keroual daughter of the Marquis de Keroual, was united in wedlock to Moysse Gaudichoux, who had just been sentenced to ten years' penal servitude.

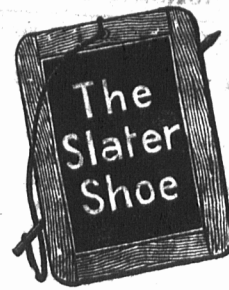

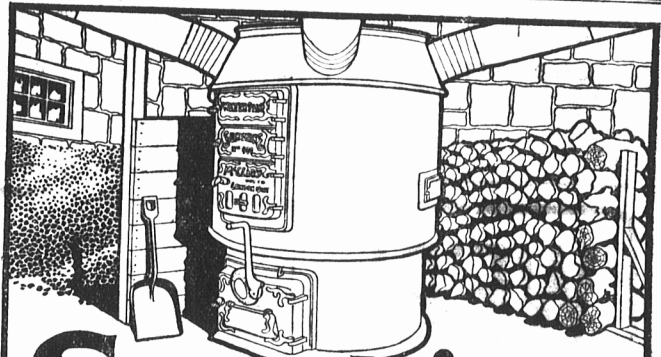
