#### HEATHERDALE RED CROSS REPORT

On Tuesday, March 5th the Heatherdale Branch of the Red Cross Society gave a complimentary entertainment and supper to the residents of the district, including children, in appreciation of the cordial response this society has met with throughout the three years of its existence.

Preliminary to the carrying out of a short programme, Mr. W. A. McPhee was chosen chairman.

Mrs. J. M. Bruce presided very acceptably at the organ.

The Secretary gave a brief review of the work done by this society since it was organized Feb. 2nd 1916 as follows: 535 pair of socks were shipped besides sheets, pillow slips, towels, night suits and Christmas parcels for the soldiers. The total amount of cash raised during the three years was \$250.61. Total expenditure \$349.73. Balance to be forwarded to R. C. Treasurer 88 cents. Account balance \$359.16—\$350.61.

The expenditure includes 255 payments amounting to \$77.00 to the Red Cross Fund and the Prisoners of War Fund. The receipts including collection made in July 1918 which has not yet been published, contribute as follows: J. J. McLeod \$5.00; D.

After supper was served, several of the residents present made suitable remarks, when a tender chord was touched, expressive of the sympathy of the community for those among us whose homes are made sad by the absence of their boys whose bodies rest beneath the field of strife. The gathering was honored by the presence of Mr. Hugh McDonald one of our returned soldiers who has won the long service Medal. A vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Hugh Mathieson for selections on the gramophone and to the women for the evening's entertainment. A chorus followed by the National Anthem, was sung in closing.

—BANK MANAGER DEAD.—The many friends of Mr. Ernest S. Reid, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada at Tyne Valley, were shocked to learn of his death, which occurred at Tyne Valley on Monday, after a brief illness of influenza, at the early age of 28 years. The deceased was an honourable and deservedly popular young man, and a competent bank official, and his death will be mourned by a large circle of relatives and friends. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. R.R. Reid, Crapaud, and one sister Mrs. Harry Norton, survive. The body was brought from Tyne Valley Tuesday morning and was taken to Crapaud, for interment.

—PATRIOTIC FAMILIES.—One of the many families that have done their part in the Great War is that of Mrs. Catherine Burke, Daruley, whose three sons have recently been discharged from the army. Private Thomas enlisted in March 1916 in the original 105th after some time in England crossed to France with re-inforcement for the 26th Battalion while on the Arras front April 18th 1918 was wounded in the right shoulder and arm and returned to Canada Christmas eve and is now fully restored to health. Pte. Charles enlisted with the 105th Draft before he was 16 years of age. Crossed to England in May 1917 crossed to France the following November with re-inforcements for the 26th Battalion where he fought side by side with his brother Thomas, and was seriously wounded on June 25th 1918. Necessitating the amputation of two middle fingers from his right hand also a bone from back of hand, thirteen pieces of shrapnel in all being taken from his both legs and hand and another piece is still on his lung. He came home to Canada on the first Hospital ship after the Armistice was signed the first ship to travel with all lights beaming. He is looking fine and on the way to recovery as his many friends hope. Sergt. George H. served some time in the American Army but did not get overseas before the armistice was signed. He has resided in the U.S. for 12 years. Pte. A. Gallant a brother-in-law of these boys, is still in England suffering from effects of the Hun gas, received last July. Needless to say he is very anxious to get back home to P.E.I. as his many friends hope his
