### WEATHER PROGNOSTICATIONS.

Certain weather proverbs, have come  
down to us from the immemorial past,  
in the days when people believed in signs,  
omens, witchcraft and many other things  
that are now ignored or discredited.  
Among them are several which relate to  
Candlemas Day, 2nd February, as:

If Candlemas Day is fine and clear  
We'll have two winters in one year.

We in this practical age pay little heed  
to these sayings, and yet there may be  
a measure of truth in them. The people  
who originated this and similar prognos-  
tics had no scientific knowledge, and  
meteorology as we know it was then  
unknown. But on the other hand they  
were probably closer observers of the sky  
and of natural phenomena than we are.

We may also note that any common say-  
ing which has had such universal cur-  
rency for hundreds of years, would not  
have held its place in the minds and  
memories of men for so long a time if it  
were wholly without foundation in fact.

Yesterday was "fine and clear" and  
therefore presages that there is much  
cold weather yet to come. Whether the  
bears came out of their dens to see their  
shadows or not, as tradition says they  
are wont to do, and returned to their  
winter sleep, we do not know, but the  
famous Russian Bear is displaying a good  
deal of activity this winter.

### CAPES ROUTE AND WINTER SERVICE.

We trust the different sections of the  
Province will rally to the meeting on the  
evening of Tuesday next and elect dele-  
gates to the general convention in Char-  
lottetown one week later to deal with the  
subject of our winter communication.

Almost every elector has a pecuniary  
interest in this matter, as a producer,  
a shipper, a passenger or a recipient of  
papers or letters from the mainland. One  
great obstacle in the way of securing the  
urgently needed improvement is the  
want of united and concerted action.

Many schemes have been proposed.  
What is wanted is one clearly defined  
plan upon which all can unite. As things  
have been, opposing sectional interests  
have from time to time sent memorials  
to Ottawa, the result of which has been  
to confuse the minds of Ministers rather  
than to enlighten them. They profess  
not to know what we want. And yet it  
ought not to be difficult to formulate a  
scheme upon which all can agree.

On one point at least there is now a  
general agreement, and that is the want  
of a third winter steamer. The Stanley  
is getting to be an old boat now, though  
still capable of excellent service. An-  
other point upon which most persons will  
agree is that there should be a steamer  
on the western route. Such a service  
would be of great utility during those

periods when the Georgetown Picton  
route is blocked by heavy ice and north-  
eastern gales. With the Capes Route  
equipped with proper terminals our  
chances would be greatly improved. We  
feel sure that when our Summerside  
friends come to consider this question  
fully they will find it to be greatly to  
their interest. So long as practicable this  
steamer would ply between Tormentine  
and Summerside, perhaps touching at  
Carleton Place, which must in any case  
almost be touched by the passing boat.

When Summerside is blocked, let the  
steamer ply between the Capes direct.  
Moreover, experience has proved that it  
will be difficult hereafter to get a steamer  
for the western winter route unless in  
connection with an equipment of a termi-  
nal port on this side in addition to  
Summerside.

Georgetown is admittedly the Island's  
best winter port, but the route to Picton  
has admittedly great drawbacks. The  
scheme above roughly outlined would  
seem to be the one most feasible to guard  
all important interests and at the same  
time give a greatly improved winter ser-  
vice. We believe if it were carried out  
there would be very few days in the win-  
ter when we should not have communi-  
cation with the mainland according to  
the terms of union. With a winter  
steamer plying between Cape Tormentine  
and the Island, and the iceboats at hand  
as an auxiliary, it must be seen that our  
chances of continuous communication  
would be immensely improved, and with-  
out detriment to any existing route or  
interest. Is it not worth while to make a  
long pull, a strong pull and a pull all  
together to attain so extremely important  
and desirable an object?

**THE WELSH REVIVAL.**

A remarkable revival movement now in  
progress in Wales has set the Principality  
afire with religious enthusiasm. A  
young man named Evan Roberts with his  
"singing sisterhood" is generally regarded  
as its principal leader. The movement is  
described as a "singing" and not a "preach-  
ing" revival. As a result of the revival  
of religion we are told the public houses  
are almost deserted, the police magistrates  
find their work greatly reduced, while  
singing prayer meetings are held at the  
bottom of mine shafts and open air services  
on the deserted foot ball grounds. Mr.  
Stead who has visited the scene of the  
revival tells of thousands professing con-  
version. He thinks the movement will  
spread and give an impulse to the churches  
throughout the world. The Salvation  
Army is co-operating with the movement.  
Three fourths of the meetings consist of  
singing. No one uses a hymn book. No  
one gives out a hymn. And yet confusion  
is avoided. The singing sisters spoken of  
one of whom was a professional singer  
before her conversion, are as conspicuous  
figures in the movement as Evan Roberts  
himself. Some of their solos are described  
as wonders of dramatic and musical ap-  
peal. The revival, judged by its results  
seems to be approved by the denomina-  
tional and secular press alike. The  
London Guardian (Church of England)  
says it is changing for the better the lives  
of thousands.
