With him were two ministerial friends, both of P. E. I. Speaking with the Post Mr. Howard said he had enjoyed his trip very much. It afforded him an opportunity to see that country which he had never before enjoyed, and at a time that was most desirable. "If I were a young man," he said, "and wanted to farm that is the place I would settle in." The young man with a little back bone in him who is not afraid of work, is sure to get along well in the Canadian West if he wants to farm. Mr. Howard visited several of the western towns and cities, and may now be looked upon as an authority on the harvesting of wheat. The weather has been particularly favorable for the farmers he says, and the grain is being harvested in prime condition. Mr. Howard says the report that many of the harvesters could not get work was incorrect. Even now there is a brisk demand for men, and good wages are being paid. Very little difficulty was experienced in securing work by men who were really anxious to get something to do. A great many roving spirits took advantage of these excursions, and if they could not obtain the very best positions on the main lines at the highest salaries, they found fault. Mr. Howard, however, agrees with the suggestion contained in a recent article in this paper, that the Government or the C. P. R. Company or both should have a committee to take charge of these men upon their arrival in Winnipeg and assist them in securing work. Mr. Howard returns feeling greatly benefited by his trip.—Sackville Post.
