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## Barney Ross Outclasses Izzy Jannazzo To Retain Title In 15 Round Bout

NEW YORK, Nov. 27—(AP)—Barney Ross retained his world's welterweight title here tonight by defeating Izzy Jannazzo, New York Italian, in a 15-round struggle in Madison Square Garden.

Making his first title start since regaining the crown from Jimmy McLarin of Vancouver a year ago last May, Ross combined a flying start and a strong finish to outclass Jannazzo before a disappointing turnout of only 8,484 customers who paid \$22,840.83 to see the contest.

The Associated Press score card credited Ross with 10 of the 15 heats. Jannazzo was given four and one was called even. Jannazzo was penalized two rounds for low punches.

The decision, greeted by mingled cheers and hoots, was unanimous on the part of Referee Johnny McAvoy and judges Charlie Lynch and Marty Morawec.

scoring repeatedly with his left and long right, captured the seventh and eighth, held the championship even in the ninth and then went on to win the 10th.

With Jannazzo forcing the action, Ross kept swinging but his punches were landing mostly on the New Yorker's back and fore arms.

Ross began finding his mark again with his right to take the 11th and 12th. He dropped the 13th, but got back in the win column in the 14th, and 15th, the last of which Jannazzo dropped on a low punch.

**Wins Decision**

Enrico Venturi, flashy Italian lightweight, won a close decision over Bushy Graham, the Utica, N. Y., veteran in the eighth round semi-final.

Venturi scaled 137 1-2 pounds to Graham's 135 3-4.

Graham, former world's bantamweight champion, now fighting as a lightweight, was more than a match for the Italian star in the early heats, but tired near the end.

In another eight round Baby Cananova, Mexican featherweight and lightweight champion, won a unanimous decision over Irish Eddie Brink of Scranton, Pa. Brink was floored twice for counts of nine in the seventh. Weights were: Casanova, 130 1-4, Brink 134 3-4.

**Two Knockdowns**

There were only two knockdowns with Jannazzo the victim each time. In the second Ross connected with a right to the jaw that sent Jannazzo to the deck for a count of one. Again in the fifth, while backing away from a Ross punch, Jannazzo caught another short right on the button and went down for a count of two.

Ross has agreed to make his next start against Ceferino Garcia, Los Angeles Filipino, within 60 days. Jannazzo and Garcia recently fought a draw in a bout to produce a challenger for the champion.

If successful in turning back Garcia, the chances are that Ross will be matched with his old rival, McLarin, for an outdoor show next summer.

Tonight's bout was tame and uninteresting, with each boy looking good and bad in spots.

## Regina Will Defend Grey Cup, Report

REGINA, Nov. 27—Regina Roughriders, Western Canada rugby champions, decided at an emergency meeting tonight to defend the Grey Cup for the West against Eastern Canada's football champions December 12. They will play without five men declared ineligible by the Canadian Rugby Union.

Earlier in the day Winnipeg sought Roughriders' permission to make the trip east for the final. N. J. Taylor, president of the Regina Club, stated he had no objections but developments later in the day forced him to telegraph Stan Pepler of Winnipeg, President of the Western Canada Union to disregard previous conversations and await developments by the Roughriders executive.

**Bank On Herman**

TORONTO, Nov. 27—Ottawa Roughriders nailed a large portion of faith to Tiny Herman's oversize right boot tonight as they prepared to go into the second game of their series with Toronto Argonauts for the big four football championship.

The Ottawa man-mountain, who used to play football in Halifax, virtually kicked Riders into the big four final, and on tomorrow's concrete-hard turf Ottawa looks for more points from his broad toe as the Roughriders seek the right to meet Sarnia in the Eastern Canadian final.

Winners against Sarnia will meet the western invaders in the Canadian final.

Ottawa carries a four-point lead into tomorrow's game, and they believe it will be enough. Herman's booting was chiefly responsible for their last Saturday win over Argos in the opening game.

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 27—(AP)—Mayor John Boyd Thacher sent a telegram to Babe Ruth today telling him Albany would welcome him as manager of the Albany International League baseball club.

The Chamber of Commerce also sent the former "Sultan of Swat" a message informing him the body would be pleased if he were to accept the position.

Ruth and officials of the Albany club will meet tomorrow in New York City to discuss the manager-ship. Joe Cambria, Albany owner, earlier this week offered Ruth the job, but Ruth said he was not interested.

## Huskies Chosen For Classic

SEATTLE, Nov. 27—University of Washington today received official notification that its Huskies will represent the west in the Rose Bowl and turned to consideration of an opponent for the football classic.

Advised by Prof. Hugh C. Willett, president, that the Pacific Coast Conference unanimously had selected the Huskies for the Pasadena game Jan. 1, Athletic Director Ray Eckmann declined to hazard a guess as to whom the Huskies would invite from the south or east as an opponent.



**DOWN THE BACK STRETCH**

From every section of the country followers of harness racing gathered in New York this week to attend the 24th annual Old Glory Sale. The racing men for the most part were interested in yearlings from Walnut Hall, Hanover Shoe, The Village, Peninsular and Almahurst Farms. This is because so many campaigning owners delight to watch their juveniles being trained in the sunny south during the winter months, and also get a kick out of the gamble which an untrained or even partially trained colt provides. Then again colt racing is attractive for the reason that the tops can win a lot more money than the best aged campaigners.

The news flashed from the sale that Mr. McElwain 159 1-2 has been sold to the Hanover Shoe Farms for \$15,500 is popular, because it was feared that this wonderful son of Guy Axworthy 208 1-4 might go abroad. His companion stallion at Almahurst Farm, Vansandt 200 3-4, was sold to an Austrian horseman for \$2,000. It does not seem as though Walnut Hall Farm was very anxious to further strengthen their blood lines with new infusions of San Francisco blood or they would have purchased this young stallion—the fastest living son of Walnut Hall's famous sire, San Francisco 207 1-4. Perhaps it is because the San Francisco's were not noted as colt trotters although some of them were high class.

Judging by the despatches from Alberta one would think that all is confusion there and that the purchase of a sire of speed would be about the last thing people in that abbreviated country would consider, but evidently they are not un-mindful of the lighter side of life, as in addition to the stallion they purchased some brood mares and young racing stock. I also picked up an exchange of a few evenings ago and found particulars of several meets held in Vienna within the past six months with substantial purses for trotters. There are no pacers raced in France, Belgium, Germany, Austria or Italy. They have no use for pacers, and I presume if a man appeared with a horse adorned with a set of hoppers on one of their tracks he would create the utmost astonishment.

The noted Italian patron of the harness race sport, Count F. O. Mangelli, has purchased the three-year-old filly Ruth M. Mac 201 3-4 and she will be shipped in a few days to Milan. Count Mangelli had previously purchased Prince Hall (4) 200 3-4, Emily Stokes (3) 201 1-2, Truax (4) 203 1-2 and The Laurel Hall (4) 206 1-4 in addition to a number of brood mares.

Ruth M. Mac is one of the most attractive young trotters in America and is a full sister to Muscletone (3) 202, also exported to Italy three years ago, and which has proved the best trotter in Europe, recently setting up a new record in France.

Will Caton, who drove the three-year-olds Protector and The Marchioness to world's records of 1:59 1-4, has passed the sixty year mark. For twenty-one years he was trainer for the Czar of Russia and had brought the trotting sport in that country to a high pitch, both in quality of performance

## Showdown On Proposed Bout Is Sought

NEW YORK, Nov. 27—The New York State Athletic Commission took steps today to bring about a showdown on a James J. Braddock-Max Schmeling heavyweight title fight.

The commission ordered Madison Square Garden and the 20th Century Sporting Club, joint promoters, to file contracts, naming a date for the show, within two weeks.

At the same time, a cable was sent Schmeling in Germany asking him to be present in person, or be represented by somebody armed with power of attorney, to approve the proposed plans.

Both Col. John Reed Kilpatrick, Garden president, and Sol Strauss, representing the 20th Century, said they had contracts signed by Schmeling agreeing to fight Braddock either June 3 or June 10, but they were told the papers would have to be filed with the commission before they would be recognized.

Perturbed because of plans to match Braddock in a no decision city before Schmeling gets his promised shot at the title, the German's cable said he is relying on the Commission's promise that he is the only legitimate challenger for Braddock's crown and that the champion's first championship defence must be made against him.

Prior to this Braddock was examined by three commission physicians and pronounced completely cured of the arthritis that caused postponement of his September date with Schmeling.

## Picard Leads Field With Sub Par Golf

AUGUSTA, Ga., Nov. 27—Par figures staggered again: a concerted attack of 214 golf campaigners today and when the field of battle was cleared Henry Picard, lanky belter from Hershey, Pa., led with a fine 69 in the first round of the 72-hole \$5,000 Augusta open tournament.

Far below form, Bob Gray of Windsor, the only Canadian starter, wound up far back with an 80. He needed 41 going out and could clip but two strokes from that big total coming home.

Picard, leading money winner of 1935, negotiated the distance in two under par, while four other players shattered standard figures in the face of wintry blasts, sweeping two courses required for the heavy field.

Picard, playing the par-71 Forest Hills layout, bagged two birdies coming home to clip two strokes from carded figures. Playing the same course, Tony Manero of Greensboro, N. C., United States open champion, and Horton Smith of Chicago lepped a stroke from the par with cards of 70.
