A JUNE BLIZZARD IN THE NORTHWEST.

The other day the thermometer dropped to seven degrees below the freezing point in the Canadian prairie country, and this has been followed by a snow and sleet storm over Alberta, sufficient to break down the telegraph lines, seriously hamper train operations and cause the death of many cattle in the ranch

causing them to stool out and begin a second growth. This will make the harvest later and increase the danger of being frozen by the fall frosts before the grain has fully ripened.

The lure of the West has been for a good while very strong upon the people of the Eastern Provinces, and many have been tempted to sell all that they possessed and hasten to the prairie country. It is worth while for those who contemplate a similar course to pause for a moment and contrast our delightful spring weather, our rapidly growing crops and other favorable conditions with what is now occurring in the Northwest. True the contrasts may not always be so favorable to the Island Province as they are, at the present moment, but we have vastly less to fear from summer and fall frosts, and from desolating hail storms, cyclones and prairie fires than has the Northwest farmer. And we have good water here, fairly abundant fuel, easy access to churches, schools, and post offices, not all of which are so easily within the reach of the prairie settler, especially in the newer sections. All of which may be worth thinking over.

Again the world is ringing with the exploits of an aviator. This time it is an Englishman who has signalled himself in flight. The successful flier is Hon. Charles Rolls, a captain in the British Army Motor Reserve. The cable tells that he eclipsed the feats of Bleriot and De Lesseps, each of whom had flown once across the English Channel. Rolls made the round trip from Dover to Calais and return, without alighting, and did it in fifty minutes! From this on the story of the fliers will be one of breaking records and making new and notable achievements.

There are so many authentic accounts of strange appearances in the sky and air about May 18 and 19, the time of the supposed passage of the earth through the comet's tail, that they must be credited. The reports come from various parts of our own Province and from observations at sea and in distant lands. Nothing that occurred was very alarming, or in any case harmful, so far as our reading goes. Whether any new element has been added to the air we breathe may be doubted, although it is believed by some. If true, we trust it may be something invigorating and health giving.

Hon. L. C. Owen, still hale and hearty in his 88th year, was born in Charlottetown November 1, 1822. He was educated at private schools and Central Academy. His father, Thomas Owen of Malpeque, had been Postmaster General of the Province from 1842 to 1860, and he succeeded to that office and held it down to 1866. He gave good and extended service in political life both in the Legislative Council, of which he became President, and in the Assembly, in which he sat at various times between 1866 and 1879. May the worthy veteran's peaceful and happy Indian summer of life be prolonged as far as he may desire it to be into the years to come!

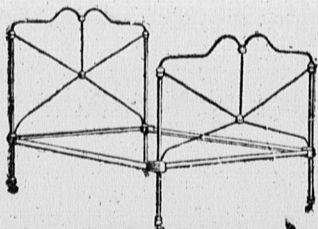

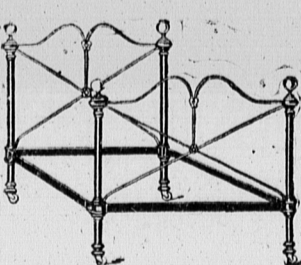

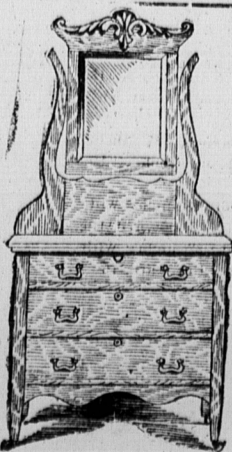
