MINING

TORONTO, April 2—The new advance in the Toronto mining share market maintained its rate of progress today with volume still around the million share mark. The advance practically all came along in the first 15 minutes of trading and from then on the gains were trimmed under a run of profit-taking. Noranda was an outstanding exception. The big copper gathered strength slowly and pressed upward to 54 1-2, a new high price and closed at its top for the day. A gain of 1 1-4 was registered.

The gold share index was advanced 78 to 128.89 and the miscellaneous mines advanced two points to 136.95. Trading in the golds was chiefly centered in the Red Lake and Patricia districts stocks. McKenzie Red Lake turned over 80,000 shares and gained 4 cents on top of Wednesday's advance of 10 cents. Red Lake Gold Share accounted profit-taking in quantity and the price backed up 5 cents to 1.05. Pickle Crow had a swing down of 35 cents but fully recovered.

Footling along with Noranda, several other base metals including Hudson Bay, Falconbridge, Sudbury Basin, Sherritt, Waite-Waite-Amulet and Base Metals Corporation recorded advances.

Presbytery of P. E. I.

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in regular quarterly session at 11 a.m. on Tuesday, March 3rd in Zion Church Hall, Charlottetown, and was opened in due form by Rev. W. O. Rhoad, Moderator, assisted by Rev. G. Carlyle Webster and Rev. Fred Williamson. Those present were Rev. W. O. Rhoad, Moderator; Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, clerk; Rev. Fred Williamson, Rev. G. Carlyle Webster, Rev. M. E. Genge, D.D., Rev. E. C. Robertson and Mr. V. E. Osborn, student catechist and Messrs. John R. McWilliams, Oswald Graham, Augustus Waddell, D. M. Bernard, A. W. Stewart, W. M. McWilliams, A. A. McDonald, Alex. McKenzie, Hugh McPherson, Lauchlan Bruce, John A. Stewart, Elders, and Thos. Millar, Elders, and Messrs. John Anderson, Duncan Nicholson and Angus McDonald, representative laymen.

In the absence of Angus McLean, representative Elder of Wood Islands and Murray Harbour South because of illness, and of Chas. K. Martin, representative Elder of Caledonia also because of illness, Messrs. John A. Stewart, Wood Islands and Hugh McPherson, Caledonia, were appointed to take the place of these two representative Elders, and thus given the privilege to sit and correspond.

Messages were received from three of the Ministers giving reasons for their absence. From Rev. R. Moorhead Legate D.D., because of a slight indisposition, from Rev. T. Owen Hughes because of illness and from Rev. J. W. S. Lowry, D.D., because of quite a serious accident on account of which he was not able to leave the house for several weeks.

After the minutes of the last regular session and also those of a special meeting were disposed of the correspondence was dealt with.

The Presbytery of London is taking on trials for license Mr. Frank Lawson, who will graduate from the Union Theological Seminary this Spring.

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island having come to know Mr. Lawson because of having labored within the bounds during the summer months of 1934, approved of the action of the Presbytery of London.

The Presbytery of Regina is making application to the General Assembly of the Church in Canada for permission to receive Rev. Andrew Arvey, B.A., a graduate of Bloomfield Seminary as a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. The application was laid on the table.

Mr. Lloyd H. Henderson, Free-lance, is making application to the General Board of Missionaries for work in the mission fields of the Presbyterian Church in Canada during the coming Summer months. The Presbytery unanimously endorsed the application.

The Clerk, Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, read a letter from Rev. T. Owen Hughes asking the Presbytery to relieve him of the interim-moderatorship of the sessions of both the congregations of Marshfield and Caledonia. It was agreed by Presbytery that Mr. Hughes be urged to remain as interim-moderator and that Rev. G. Carlyle Webster be appointed as interim-moderator of the Caledonia session.

A number of reports were then submitted to the court. The Home Missions report was given by Rev. G. Carlyle Webster, convener of the Home Missions Committee.

The grants asked for this year are the same as those of last year with the exception of the special grants given last year to Caledonia. It is possible that there may be a further ten per cent cut on the grants this year.

The Home Missions committee will apply for a student for the West Point, O'Leary and Coleman mission field and also for one for the Caledonia congregation for the summer months. Mr. Hugh McPherson stated to the court that the people of Caledonia were asking to have Mr. Young, son of Rev. Luther Young
