THE BARN BURNING

Pippey is Sent up to the Supreme Court

WOOD IS DISCHARGED

The Full Proceedings of Yesterday's Trial are Recorded.

The Jenkins' incendiary preliminary investigation was concluded yesterday morning.

Mr. Henry Jenkins was the only witness examined and after corroborating his father's evidence to a large extent, he said that after the fire I went down with my brother. I went to the east and saw where a waggon had turned. I thought the milkman was the first track passing that way on Friday morning. All the people in my father's house were in bed long before the fire. We were not candling eggs.

To Mr. Johnson.—The fire had greater headway in east barn. I left home about noon to get a load of eggs. I stopped at the Loan Star corner about two and a half miles from home. It was about dark when I left the corner. When I got home I unharnessed the horse but did not use a match or a light. After putting away the horse I went into the house and returned to the barn in about half an hour with a light. I was in both buildings after dark. I do not smoke now and never smoked in my life. Fred took the dog out and put him in the barn. He wanted me to take the dog but I had my boots off and Fred ran out with the dog. I sleep right off the kitchen. I do not think that Fred had time to light a match. We talked over the fire next morning. I don't think my father blamed anybody on Friday morning. He mentioned Sam Wood's name and said he would see about the threat and would make him prove where he was that night. When I came in from the fire and looked at my watch. I looked a second time and it was 12.30. I tried to do not know why my father went to Pippey's gate.

To Mr. Peters.—I opened the door of the waggon house with a broom handle. It was impossible to get in at all.

To Mr. Johnson.—My father said he had \$500 insurance. There was a bottle of turpentine in barn. The kerosene oil is kept in the house.

At this stage Mr. Peters said that a strong presumptive case had been made out against Pippey. As far as Wood is concerned the evidence is not strong and he would therefore rest the case for the prosecution.

Mr. Johnson counsel for the prisoners said that in so far as Wood was concerned he submitted that the crown had failed to make out any case and therefore asked for his discharge. So far as Pippey was concerned as the Attorney General would insist on his being sent to the supreme court for trial he (Mr. Johnson) would reserve his defence until then.

Stipendiary Palmer said that in regard to Wood there is no evidence to place him on trial. In regard to Pippey also there is no direct evidence connecting him he thought there was a certain amount of suspicious circumstances namely threats, marks of shoes, and the prisoners actions after the burning of the buildings and before the incarceration.

Mr. Johnson then stated that if his Honor thought it necessary he could submit evidence in Mr. Wood's case that would trace him to his own door on night of crime.

The Stipendiary in reply said that in Woods case he did not consider it necessary for the counsel for the defence to submit evidence. He would therefore discharge Wood and send Pippey up to stand his trial in the Supreme Court.
