## Cattle Prices On The French Market

TORONTO, June 13.—The following prices of cattle on French markets have been prepared for the Canadian Press by P. W. T. Ross, of Toronto:

Week ending May 20, West showed common and good steers \$9.16 to \$12.33, cows \$9.16 to \$12.27, bulls \$8.46 to \$10.57, cutters \$7.40 to \$8.46. North and East showed common and good steers \$10.93 to \$12.89, cows \$9.50 to \$12.95, bulls \$10.07 to \$11.22. Valence, \$7.57; Calgary steers \$4.99 to \$7.61, cows \$4.33 to \$7.48, bulls \$4.58 to \$7.22. Centre showed all kinds, in first quality, \$12.97, second \$12.37, third \$9.53, extreme low 7.40. Brieux all kinds and qualities \$8.97 to \$12.56. There was a difference in exchange of 50 to 60 points to France's disadvantage compared with previous week to which markets have not yet responded in equivalent augmentation of price in French money, except eastern markets and only partially.

TORONTO, Ont., June 13.—The following prices of cattle on French markets have been prepared for the Canadian Press by P. W. T. Ross of Toronto:

Paris, May 19 and 22, Monday and Tuesday, through 5,934 cattle. Good cows went at \$9.02, to \$11.07, common \$6.98 to \$8.88, good bulls \$10.22 common \$6.43 to \$9.38, cutters \$5.65 and over; this is 20c to 30c off May 12 market roughly speaking. Choice steers averaged \$11.90 and heifers \$12.55, only 10c off, a common kind's steers \$9.87 heifers \$10.86. Prices very firm, tops in cows being \$10.77, steers 25c, higher and of course heifers still higher at \$11.54. Cholet ran through 364 steers and 406 cows on May 16, not counting bulls and heifers. Mich cows would still appear to be held at \$150 to \$170, occasionally \$200 and over for very choice.
