Mr. McPhail was born on the home place where he still resides, January 22nd, 1822 and is thus entering his eighty-second year. Notwithstanding that he has passed the allotted span of life, he is still well preserved in his many vigor and to the observer would not appear more than sixty. His hair is not yet tinged with white and he possesses all his faculties, still able to do a good day's work on the farm and transact his business when he visits the City. Mr. McPhail's grandfather emigrated from Grenock in the year 1820 and purchased a five hundred acre farm which was afterwards subdivided among his sons, part of which is still held by Mr. McPhail. The octogenarian has three sons and three grand children, one of whom resides in California where he is making his mark.

The cablegram passed read as follows: Montreal weak and declining, London dull, Montreal 10 1/2 to 10 3/4, London 10 1/2 to 10 3/4. Brackville sold at 10 to 10 1/2. The cheese board was Re Point, 83; Lakeville, 120; St. Peter's, 110; East River, 145; Stanley Bridge, 318; New Glasgow, 100; Newport, 70; H. Selbro, 60; Union, 65; Cornwall, 55; Emerald, 270; Kensington, 470; Gosport, 40; Hampton, 45; Summerside, 180; Mount Stewart, 150. The highest bid was 10 1/2 by Horace Hazard. He took Hazelbrook, Union, Cornwall, Hampton, East River, St. Peter's. At the same price Mr. Spillett took Red Point, Stanley Bridge, Emerald, Kensington, and Gosport. The rules of deducting the half pound from every cheese to allow for shrinkage was discussed at some length. The matter was left over till next session. The thanks of the Board were passed to the Board of Trade for the use of their room for the season. Scott alleges that while he was in the bar kept by Walter Josey, Queen street during the Friday of Exhibition week McCallum snatched from his hand \$140 in notes which he had just received for a horse which he had sold. McCallum made his escape and could not be found again till yesterday by Scott who seized the first possible opportunity to have him arrested.
