DELIVERS SECOND LECTURE.—The Sadhu Nelson Christananda delivered the second of his interesting series of lectures in St. Paul's Parish Hall last evening, before a considerable audience for a warm summer evening. His topic was Spiritual Evolution. In the course of his remarks he first unfolded something of the attitude of mind of the cultured folk among his people to the problem of human existence and the various attempts that are made to satisfy the natural seeking of the human heart. Proceeding he gave to his audience the teacher's method for answering the questions which are propounded to him, by a clever series of pictures and drawings illustrating the futility of the purely intellectual and the necessity of the Christian and spiritual interpretation. Briefly he referred to the Hindoo theory of the transmigration of the soul, indicating that the fallacy in such a theory is not hard to find. The great natural law of variety rather effectually discounts the theory of evolution.
