THE NEW ONTARIO LIQUOR LAW

The liquor seller is liable for damages resulting from acts of a person under the influence of liquor sold by him. 4. The Liquor Authority Control Board under Judge Robb is continued. 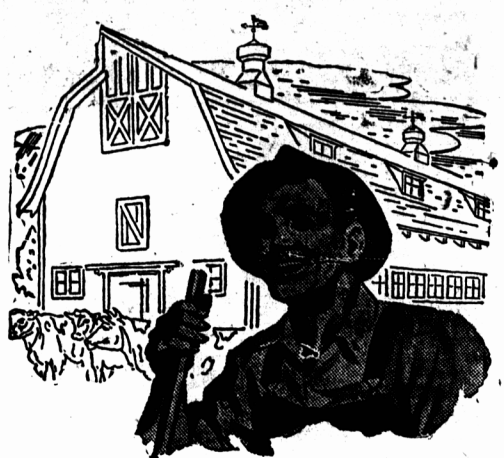

Single's, both of which were admirably rendered, and reflected credit, not only on the boys themselves, but on those who had trained them. 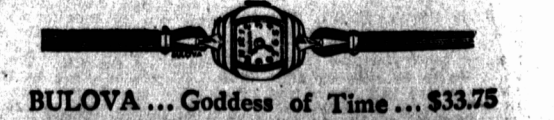
