WILL REVERT TO STATUS OF COLONY

Legislative Assembly Passes Resolution 25 to 27—Will Go to Legislative Council.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 28.—(C. P. Cable)—The Legislative Assembly tonight moved almost unanimously toward putting Newfoundland back under the wing of the United Kingdom.

Approving a Royal Commission's proposal for relinquishing rights of a Dominion and placing the Island under a Commission Government until it is again self-supporting, 25 out of the Assembly's 27 members voted for a resolution petitioning His Majesty to provide a new administration on the basis of the Amulree Report.

BANK REPORT MADE PUBLIC

OTTAWA, Nov. 28.—The bank statement giving the conditions of the Canadian Chartered Banks on October 31, was made public by the Department of Finance today and was of more than ordinary importance as the first statement since the government floated its conversion loan in October. It was also the first statement since the Canadian dollar approached par in New York. On October 31, the Canadian dollar was worth 98 9-16 in U. S. funds.

The only dissenters were the two opposition members, F. Gordon Bradley, former Solicitor General, and R. J. Starks, who left the chamber after a series of proposed amendments were rejected by straight party vote.

The amendments, one of which sought to delay legislative action pending a plebiscite, were moved by Bradley. Because they were not accepted, they were not recorded in the minutes.

Dr. H. M. Mosdell, who entered the House as an Independent by acclamation, voted with the 24 United Newfoundland Party members.

The Assembly's resolution will be presented to the Legislative Council tomorrow, and indications tonight were to the effect the Upper House would concur.

NEWFOUNDLAND CRAFT MISSING

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 28.—Searching craft scanned the seas off Newfoundland today for a missing schooner while a second vessel lay hard and fast against the Island's rugged shore, driven around in an Atlantic storm.

The missing craft was the Edvard Vag last reported off Bacallou Island on the east coast as she proceeded Saturday towards Bonavista Bay.

But a raging gale lashed the coast the same day, and the schooner failed to reach port. Today, the Cape Agulhas and other vessels put to sea to search for the schooner.

In the same storm the schooner Eskotic piled on shore at Greenspond Island, off the north coast of Bonavista Bay. Capt. Kelloway and his crew escaped to shore in the boats, but their craft was reported a total loss.

Caledonia Youth Faces Charge Of Assault

GLEBE BAY, N. S., Nov. 28.—(C. P. Cable)—The mysterious attack on Neil MacDonald 52 year old steamship operator, found unconscious in a gutter early Sunday morning, was solved tonight. Royal Canadian Mounted Police said, with a confession from Alex Boyd of Caledonia.

Police said Boyd admitted beating the man, who he claimed had been peering through the Boyd kitchen window. Officers said his admission of striking the man with his fist, however, did not account for the battered condition of the victim's face and head.

Two other youths, John Meehan and Rennie Steele, held on suspicion in the case, were still in jail on charges of breaking and

France Is Ready For Arms Talks

Nations Willing To Join In Discussions At Either Rome Or Geneva To Prevent Armament Race.

N.B. GROWERS HOPEFUL OF BETTER PRICES

FREDERICTON, N.B., Nov. 28.—The seed potato business in New Brunswick is due for a pickup in December as the result of Cuba coming into the market again for a quantity of seed for the planting of the year's second crop in the Island Country.

Requirements of Cuba in regard to certified seed stock are being met chiefly by the growers of this Province. During October New Brunswick shipped some 20,000 barrels, mostly Bliss Triumphs for early production, to Cuba. These were for planting in December. Green Mountains, Irish Cobblers and Bliss Triumphs will comprise the shipments going to the pearl of the Antilles up to Christmas for the crop that will be put in the ground in February.

The feeling among those in the trade in the Province is that with the improvement in business conditions in Cuba, the exports this winter will be up to the average nearly three times as much for their product as the table stock producers at the present time. The price offered for seed is \$2 a barrel, against about 70 cents for table stock. Several of the seed growers in the belief that prices will increase considerably within the next few months, plan to hold their stock until spring, when the state of Maine will begin importing for next year's planting. In the meantime, the Southern States are expected to take some seed, producing a favorable effect on demand and prices.

LIBERAL AMENDMENT IS REJECTED

WASH. NGTON, Nov. 28.—President Roosevelt is considering a token offer of \$1,000,000 from Italy on its war debt payment of \$2,138,906 due December 15.

As Mr. Roosevelt accepted an offer of \$7,500,000 from Great Britain as part payment on \$117,970,768 due next month, the offer of the Mussolini Government is expected in informed circles to be approved.

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NEGRO HANGED ON COURTHOUSE LAWN BY MISSOURI MOB

ST. JOSEPHS, Mo., Nov. 28.—Lloyd Warner, 19 year old Negro, who confessed an attack on a white girl was hanged to a tree on the courthouse lawn tonight by a mob which seized him in the Buchanan County Jail. Sheriff Otto Theisen relinquished the prisoner only after a hard fight in the jail by officers against a mob he estimated at 7,000 persons.

NATIONAL GUARDSMEN CALLED TO COMBAT MENACING CROWD WHICH STORMED MARYLAND STATE ARMORY.

Recognize Gunn Lynchers.

Onlookers at the scene said they recognized some members of the crowd as participants in the lynching of Raymond Gunn, Negro, about two years ago near Maryville after he attacked a white school teacher. Gunn was chained on top the schoolhouse. Gasoline was poured on the building and it was burned.

The rear of the jail is unprotected. There is an open air place where the prisoners are exercised. Once inside the door, the mob members were in a corridor of the jail proper.

One of the military tanks took up position at the rear of the prison, but its door was not closed securely and members of the crowd put it out of action by seizing the operator. He was taken out of the machine and released.

The crowd began hurling a barrage of stones and pieces of pipe at the jail. Deputy sheriffs and police retaliated with tear gas bombs.

Still other members of the crowd battered down the door of the sheriff's residence which is a part of the jail and the crowd poured in that entrance.

Governor Park said at Jefferson City he was advised only a handful of the approximately 65 men in the 35th tank company had been mobilized.

SALISBURY, Md., Nov. 28.—(A. P.)—A mob of more than 1,000 men stormed the State Armory here today in an unsuccessful effort to free the four men accused of participating in last month's lynching at Princess Anne.

Beaten back by tear gas and bayonets, the mob dispersed only after the State Troopers, sent by Governor Albert C. Ritchie to arrest the alleged slayers of George Aronwood, a negro, abandoned their headquarters in the armory and returned to Baltimore with their prisoners.
