PRESBYTERY General Newburn Speaks Tonight

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in regular quarterly session on Tuesday, November 3rd, in Zion Church Hall, Charlottetown and was opened in due form by the Moderator Rev. Charles J. St. Clair Jeans.

Those present were: Rev. Charles J. St. Clair Jeans, Moderator; Rev. F. Hensley Stavert, Clerk; Rev. Fred Williamson, Rev. W. E. Davies, Rev. Allister Murray, Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, Rev. Alex. R. Gibson, Rev. G. Carlyle Webster, Rev. E. C. Robertson, Rev. Donald McLean and Messrs. Thos. W. Morrison, R. G. McLaren, Oswald Graham, Samuel McPherson, A. A. McDonald, Lauchlin Bruce, Geddie Douglas and Augustus Waddell, representative elders.

Others present, not members of the court, were Rev. M. E. Genge, D.D.; Rev. D. L. Griffiths, Rev. Quincy McDowell, V. E. Ashborn, Student Catechist and Messrs. Wm. McMillan, Chas. K. Martin and George Jardine, Elders; and James Brodie, James Chisholm, George McDonald, Albert Campbell and George Campbell, representative laymen.

Rev. Quincy McDowell, Rev. M. E. Genge and Rev. D. L. Griffiths were invited to sit and to correspond.

The minutes of the last regular session held on July 14th were read and adopted as read, as were also the minutes of the special meetings held on August 21st, on September 4th and on October 7th.

There were two sessions, morning and afternoon.

In accordance with a notice of motion duly given to have the matter of the date of the annual meeting of the Presbytery considered, it was agreed that the last regular meeting of Presbytery in the fiscal year should be the annual meeting.

As one of the items of business to be dealt with at the annual meetings is the appointing of the Standing Committees of Presbytery a committee to strike standing committees was accordingly appointed. The committee consisted of Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, Rev. W. E. Davies and A. A. McDonald.

A request having been received from the New London congregation asking that the Presbytery take steps to have an extra course of studies prescribed for Mr. V. E. Orsborn preparatory to having him ordained to the ministry, the Presbytery appointed a committee consisting of Rev. Fred Williamson, Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, Rev. Alex. R. Gibson and Rev. G. Carlyle Webster to consider the matter and report later.

The correspondence was then dealt with.

Four applications from men of other churches asking to be received into the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada were read by the Clerk. These applications were as follows:

The Presbytery of Westminster is making application to the General Assembly's Commission for permission to receive the Rev. J. D. Cuddeford, Minister of the United Church of Canada as a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The Presbytery of Toronto is applying to the General Assembly's Commission of Ministers for leave to admit Rev. Thos. W. Mills, B. A., a minister of the United Church of Canada to the Ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The Presbytery of Regina is applying to the Commission of Assembly for leave to receive Rev. A. S. Oliver a minister of the United Church of Canada as a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The Presbytery of Bruce is making application to the Commission of Assembly on the Reception of Ministers for leave to receive Mr. John V. Mills, a Licentiate of the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. as a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The applications were approved of and placed on file.

The clerk read a letter from the Presbytery of Westminster, B. C. calling attention to the fact that this year 1931 marks the fiftieth anniversary of the appointment by the General Assembly of the Rev. James Robertson, D. D. to be superintendent of Missions for Manitoba and the North West Territories and realizing that the work of Dr. Robertson led to great expansion in the work of our beloved Church and helped in large degree to its preminent place in the West in his day. This Presbytery of Westminster puts again on record its profound gratitude to God for the gift of this remarkable man to the Church and to the country and asks the sessions of this Presbytery to arrange for some particular notice to be given to the life and work of the great Superintendent either by special service or otherwise and

In addition to the various Provincial Premiers who will broadcast over the radio tonight, Major-General Newburn will participate in the program over the General Electric trans-Canada network. It will be recalled General Newburn was Minister of Militia during the closing years of the war succeeding the late Sir Sam Hughes; General Newburn like the other speakers will support the new \$150,000,000 National Service Loan.

The Presbytery respectfully asks other Presbyteries to join in the Commemoration of the services of Dr. Robertson to the end that the new generation may also learn of this heroic leader in our church's life and that steps may be taken to found again a Robertson Lectureship on Missions to replace the one that has been appropriated by another body which has no historical or moral claim upon it.

After a brief discussion over the matter it was unanimously agreed that the Sessions of this Presbytery should arrange for a Robertson Day in each of our churches that thus our young people would come to know of the wonderful things accomplished for the Presbyterian Church in Canada by this great man of God.

It was also agreed that steps should be taken at once to found again a Robertson Lectureship on Missions in one of our Presbyterian Colleges to take the place of the one which, as has already been said, was appropriated in 1925 by another body which has no historical or moral claim upon it.

Letters were read from several men asking for pulpit supply work in the Maritime Synod. The letters were placed on file and it was agreed that some of these men should be communicated with at once.

Rev. G. Carlyle Webster, Convener of the Presbytery Budget Committee gave a report of the work already done on that committee.

Letters have been sent out to all of the congregations and mission fields urging them to send their allocations to Toronto at the earliest possible date. Up to the present quite a number of the congregations have only sent in a very small part of the amounts asked for.

The allocations to the individual congregations are largely the same as last year. It was recommended that the Budget committee meet in the near future and review all of the allocations to the various congregations and mission fields.

In making this review two factors are to be kept in mind. First, the size of the congregation and second, the congregation's ability to give.

It was further recommended that the new allocations be sent to the various Sessions before the end of the fiscal year so that the allocations for the different congregations could be discussed at the annual meetings which in the majority of the congregations are held early in the month of January.

Rev. R. Hensley Stavert; the Convener of the Presbytery's Home Mission committees reported that he had met with the committee who are in charge of the work in Borden and that this committee had asked to have Borden supplied with weekly service. After a short discussion over the matter the Presbytery unanimously agreed to accede to this request.

Until a minister was secured and permanently placed at Borden to give the required service the United Church of Canada offered to assist in the work at Borden—if needed.

Mr. Stavert also gave a brief report of the work done by the four students who labored within the bounds of Presbytery during the past summer. These were John Fleck, Tryon and Borden; V. E. Orsborn at Clifton, Long River, French River and Granville; Oliver W. Nugent at Bradabane, Rose Valley and North Rustico; and Delmont Yeo at Wood Islands and Wood Islands East. The work done by these young men was much appreciated by the people in these several fields.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed at most of those places during the summer. Those who assisted with this work were Rev. Chas. St. Clair Jeans,

Rev. Fred Williamson, Rev. Thos. A. Rodger and Rev. W. M. McKay. Two of these fields have paid all expenses in full and it is expected that when all returns are in from the other two fields that the amounts required from the General Board of Missions will not be large. In fact it is hoped that no grants will be required at all.

The committee to strike standing committees submitted their report. After having made two changes in the draft submitted, the Presbytery adopted the following as the list of conveners of the standing committees of Presbytery.

Foreign Missions, Rev. W. E. Davies; Home Missions, Rev. R. Moorhead Legate; Statistics, Rev. R. Hensley Stavert; Budget, Rev. G. Carlyle Webster; College and Life Service, Rev. J. Kell Fraser, D.D.; Church Life and Work, Rev. Allister Murray; Sunday Schools and Young Peoples' Societies, Rev. Alex. R. Gibson; Pension Fund, Rev. Chas. J. St. Clair Jeans; Session Records, Rev. Fred Williamson.

It was recommended by the committee that each convener select one of the other members of his committee.

In order to lighten the labors of the clerk it was further recommended that Mr. John Anderson be appointed treasurer of the Presbytery Fund. On having been consulted Mr. Anderson agreed to undertake the duties of this office.

The tour of the Island made by Rev. W. G. Brown moderator of the General assembly during the early part of September was spoken of briefly. During his eight days sojourn Mr. Brown held thirteen meetings all of which were well attended. One of the direct results of Mr. Brown's visit to the Island was the splendid response in quite a number of the congregations, made to the appeal for the "One Step Forward Fund." Already a number of the congregations have raised their dollar per member as requested.

It was unanimously agreed that Donald Campbell, Heatherdale, a young man who is looking forward to the ministry be granted a certificate of Presbytery recommending him to the Presbyterian College, Montreal, to be enrolled there as a student.

Regarding the summer school and missionary conference held at Canoe Cove August 4th to 12th as Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, Convener of the Presbytery's Committee on

Presbytery for the ensuing year.

After some minor matters were dealt with the Presbytery adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator and Clerk of which public intimation was given and the meeting was closed with the benediction by the Moderator Rev. Fred Williamson.
