HISTORY OF THE USE OF FLAGS IN THE NAVY

From the earliest times, we have read vessels being distinguished by figureheads and with flags—it seems almost as if the two of them went together, one as a sort of head or leading part of a vessel, and the other as a display of the owner or captain. Later the stems became much decorated until in the Middle Ages, we find vessels decorated all over the hulls with scroll work of various types and the masts with flags and streamers or pennants. An example of this in use to this day, is the Naval Commissioning Pendant—Which is flown from the Ensign Staff at the local Naval Barracks.

It appears that about the reign of Edward I, some sort of an international agreement was made whereby flags signified the country vessels belonged to; but, there is no doubt that many years previous to that, such flags as Provincial and National Colours had been adopted, and a certain amount of custom such as saluting by dipping the Ensign, etc., had come into practice. Previous to this form of dipping the Ensign, there appears to have been a method of saluting by the lowering of sails, and the change-over to the flag must have been a great relief to the crews.
