It seems strange after the Canadian Militia Department had prohibited any military parade, salutes or trooping of colors on the 24th as a breach of military etiquette while the army is in mourning, that King Edward should have attended upon the military ceremonies noted in our despatches of this morning. Probably his Majesty had not received a copy of the Canadian Militia Department's general order.

Probably the absence of flags and bunting from view in Charlottetown yesterday was partly due to the order issued from Ottawa in regard to military display and partly due to a sincere, if mistaken desire to honor the memory of the dead Queen. We learn that in Cardigan a different view was taken and the village was particularly gay with flags and bunting yesterday. In this city the day was very quietly observed, but many took advantage of the holiday for an outing to the country. There were a number of picnics at Keppock and other resorts, also fishing parties. Every team was out from the livery stables and still more in demand. The night train to the City from the west was greatly crowded.

WEEDY FLAVORS IN MILK. The season of weedy flavors in milk will soon be with us and they will detract very much from the quality of early June cheese and to some extent of butter. There is no way that we know of, of avoiding these flavors. Dandelions and other things will grow and if the cows are on the pastures they will eat them. By the persistent and intelligent aeration of milk these flavors can be quite largely eliminated.—Co-operative Farmer.

KING OF THE KLONDIKE HONORED BY THE POPE

TACOMA, Wn., May 21.—At Dawson, two weeks ago, Alexander McDonald, "King of the Klondike," was made a Knight of St. Gregory by authority of a special letter from the pope. The presentation was made by Rev. Father Gendreau who secured this signal honor for the Klondike gold miner, after long correspondence with Rome, in the course of which he pointed out Mr. McDonald's generous benefactions.
