WASHINGTON, July 8 (AP)—A lone American submarine following up the smashing undersea attack on Japanese warships in the Aleutian Islands July 4, was reported today to have torpedoes and probably sunk an enemy destroyer last Sunday in the vicinity of Kiska Island.

Announcement of the action was made in a navy communique which noted that this was the fifth enemy destroyer sunk or damaged by United States submarines in the Aleutians area during the two-day period July 4-5.

The Independence Day operation, carried out by at least two submarines, resulted in the sinking of two destroyers at Kiska and one at Agaitu. A third destroyer at Kiska, which is 588 nautical miles west of Dutch Harbor, was left "burning fiercely."

Thus in two days the submarines, pressing home their attack under circumstances for which had hampered serial bombardment, raised the enemy's ship losses in his attempts to consolidate his positions on the island and to sink a Japanese supply ship.

The loss of the Japanese ship taken by American submarines in the Aleutians area was reported in a navy communique which was raised to 47 sunk, 14 probably sunk and 13 damaged.

WASHINGTON, July 8 (AP)—The Japanese seemed launched upon a new effort to storm westward into Hulan, where they failed and were beaten back before three drives toward Changsha from the north and other attacks across the Kiangsi border from the east.

A clear route, at least across the southern third of the province, would be needed to advance their plan to seize the lead on their coastal shipping by winning a complete north-south railway system.

WASHINGTON, July 8 (AP)—The allied air forces—British, Australian, South African and American—are in a stronger position now than when the present campaign began six weeks ago, the R.A.F. disclosed today.

In the 42 days, it was announced 134 Axis planes were shot down in air combat for certain, more than 100 more were destroyed on the ground and 50 by anti-aircraft defenses. The number of planes listed as probably shot down run into the hundreds more.

During the same period 110 allied pilots were listed as missing—figures corresponding only roughly to the plane losses because many planes shot down have been repaired and are flying again.

WASHINGTON, July 8 (AP)—The tide appears to have turned Monday night; violent struggle still rages at Don River.

MOSCOW, July 8 (AP)—The Russians announced today that the battered city of Staryi Oskol, 65 miles west of Voronezh, has fallen to the Germans after heavy fighting but Soviet reports indicated that spirited counter-attacks have wiped out the first German bridgeheads over which the German Russian tanks the river 65 miles east of Staryi Oskol.

Russian dispatches said that light enemy units which reached the east bank of the Don River in the Voronezh area had been destroyed and the bridgeheads over which they crossed were torn down.

The tide apparently turned Monday night when the Red air force bombed and shattered German pontoon bridges and prevented the enemy from sending reinforcements to the east bank.

Staryi Oskol was an objective of a German drive which developed in full force last week-end as the Germans sought to fight their way to the Don in their Kursk offensive.

The city, the southernmost point of a triangle formed with Kursk and Voronezh, is some 30 miles north-east of Kharkov, scene of heavy fighting this spring.

WASHINGTON, July 8 (AP)—The British defenders of Egypt resorted to desert patrol and air actions today against the bronchial Axis forces west of El Alamein, but the great decision apparently was in the making in aerial battles as far away as in mid-Mediterranean Isle of Malta.

There were indications that the supplies Field Marshal Erwin Rommel needs to resume his march into Egypt were being harassed in transit overseas from Italy, and the ports of entry in Libya were being methodically bombed by the Allies.

A British communique this morning told of continuing enemy air attacks on Malta, and these intensified blows on the much-bombarded island apparently were designed to contact British attacks on Axis convoys supplying Rommel's desert armies.

The communique said British fighters shot down nine Axis fighters and damaged others in yesterday's fighting. In the Malta operation, the desert warfare combined eight British fighters were striking Rommel in the receded lost, with six of the pilots saved.

Malta Tuesday evening reported the island defenders bagged 24 enemy planes in 24 hours.
