

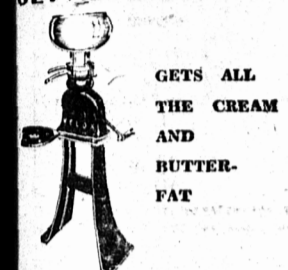

Mr. W. Ross Pigott has had a new verandah built on the front side of his residence by carpenters Ben Douglas and Joseph Coffin.

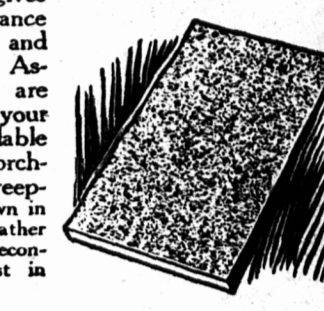


A LEAK IN THE ROOF

The late Mr. Jenkins was a man of quiet habits and possessed sterling qualities of head and heart. All who knew him will miss his pleasant greeting, as they remember his friendly face and his cheerful words, but the haze that shuts the spiritual from the natural world, though dimmed with tears, often lifts and gives us the impress of the presence of our friends, whose spirits have passed over the border. We close our eyes and try to bring before us the dear familiar faces. P. M. Jenkins was a man whose life was full of deeds of kindness and good cheer, and for some years he was identified with the commercial interests of this town and its environs. He was a very active man, and one of the kindest of men, and was known throughout the county and respected and esteemed as a real gentleman.
