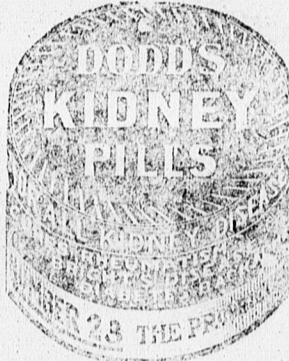
BONILLA WILL HELP GENERAL ESTRADA.

NEW ORLEANS, La, Nov 17—General Manuel Bonilla, former President of Honduras, who was deposed in 1906, is fitting out an expedition to Nicaragua to assist General Estrada, Leader of the Revolutionary forces, according to reports in the Latin American colony here.

The deposed Honduran official, according to his friends, intends to assist in the overthrow of Zelaya, and if successful to take charge of a revolution to restore himself to power in Honduras.

ENGLAND WILL BUILD COLONIES WARSHIPS

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Nov 17—In reply to a question in the house of representatives today in regard to a statement that the tender for the Dreadnought by the Dominion to the Imperial government would be submitted to the New Zealand government, Sir Joseph Ward, the premier, declared that the admiralty would invite tenders and would advise the Dominion if any other course would be improper. The ministers being responsible to parliament and the country, no tenders would be accepted until authorized by the New Zealand parliament. The warships would be built in England.

CUT OFF A WART.

KINGSTON, Ont, Nov 17—Cecil Abbott, the five year old son of Sandfield Abbott, Bath Road, is in the general hospital suffering from blood poisoning. He had a wart on his right hand and cut it off with a pair of scissors. The same evening the boy's hand began to swell. Dr. Gault called and found the lad was suffering from blood poisoning. He opened the hand and he is somewhat better. There must have been some septic matter on the scissors which caused the poison.

AMERICAN IMMIGRATION.

WINNIPEG, Nov 17—The enormous increase in the immigration of Americans to Canada is best told in cold figures, which have been compiled by the immigration authorities. For the past three months the figures have been compared, and the total number of immigrants coming through each point of entry in western Canada. These figures show a gradual increase right along, and this increase is likely to be kept up through the present month. It will be noticed that in the month of August this year the increase over the corresponding month last year is 788. September shows an increase of 1,413 and October an increase of 2,116. For the three months alone the total number is 13,511. The complete figures show that Americans are coming from all parts of the United States. Hitherto the immigration from the regular ports of entry, but on account of the tremendous immigration this year the immigration authorities had to open more doors to the American immigration, and if the great rush continues, which is anticipated, still more ports of entry will be established. SCHRR. M. V. HOPKINS MAY BE FLOATED

NORTH SYDNEY, November 17—A port warden's survey was held today on the three-masted schooner Myrtle V. Hopkins, which drove ashore yesterday afternoon a mile west of the Flat point light. The schooner was found to be pretty badly damaged, her keel being torn out and driven far up the beach and her hold is filled with water. The fact that the gale died out early last night and the sea moderated, no doubt saved her from being broken up. The surveyors believe she can be floated and if the weather is favorable tomorrow tugs will go down and endeavor to get her off.

PERILOUS TRIP OVER LAKE ERIE

BUFFALO, N. Y. Nov 17—Battling with fog and wind and rain, at times riding high above the clouds, and sweeping down into the very spray of maddened Lake Erie, three daring aviators in a big balloon were buffeted back and forth across the lake Sunday night, finally landing in the top of a tree near Derby, N. Y. Even this tempestuous landing was not made until after the wild balloon had torn away part of a farmhouse, moved a clean swath through orchards, fields, and fences, and scattered two of its aviators along the pathway of ruin. The trio of battered air navigators arrived in Buffalo last night, and left today for Cincinnati. They are J. Campbell Corey and C. V. Tevis, Cincinnati newspaper men, and George Howard, a professional balloon pilot. The big Balloon Biddack, in which the trip was made, left Latonia Sunday night. When it reached Derby, a remote town in Erie County, it had covered 582 miles. Discussing the trip, Mr Corey said the Haddock sailed at an average height of 3,000 feet until it passed over Cincinnati, Hamilton, and Dayton. Then it veered over to Columbus, where a fog was encountered. Leaving Columbus, we got into a dense fog, and then we were hit by a tornado and carried along at a frightful speed. After a while the fog cleared away, and we were near Sandusky and on the verge of the lake about 5,000 feet in the air. A hurricane carried the balloon across the lake to the Canadian shore, and a rival tempest buffeted it back to the American side. At times it travelled at a speed of 20 miles an hour. Sometimes it was 11,000 feet up in the air, far above the clouds and rain, and a few minutes later it was within 20 feet of the waters of Lake Erie, with the angry waves dashing spray upon the occupants.

OWEN SOUND, Nov 17—The case against Alex Franks, of the Pettehouse, for breach of the local option bylaw following Inspector Becker's sensational discovery of liquor within false windowing, fell through, Franks showing that he did not have a lease of the part of the hotel where the liquor was found. A charge will be laid against the lessee of the hotel.

NEW KNIGHT OF ST. PATRICK CREATED

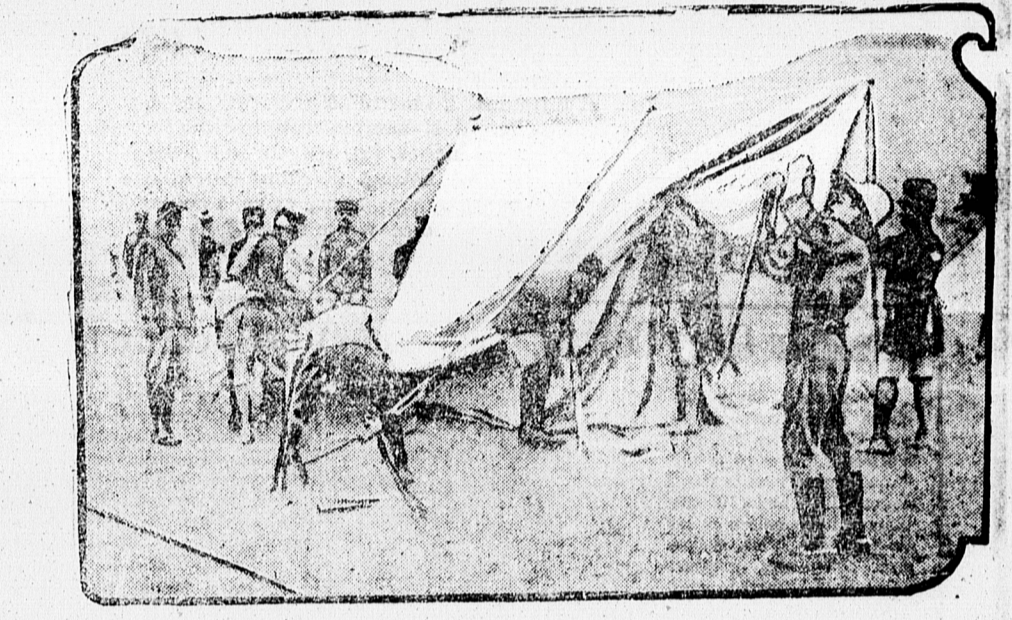
HALIFAX, Nov 17—The Earl of Arran has been appointed by the King to be a Knight of the Order of St Patrick, in the place of the Earl of Carrisfort, K. P., deceased. The Earl of Arran, the sixth bearer of the title, succeeded his father in 1901. He is also Viscount Sudley of Castle Gore, Baron Saunders of Deeply and Baron Sudley, in the peerage of the United Kingdom. The family descended from Gerald Gore, an alderman of the City of London at the close of the sixteenth century, from one of whose sons also is derived the family of Gore Langton, represented by Earl Temple. The new Knight of St Patrick was formerly adjutant and brevet major Royal Horse Guards. He served in the Egyptian Cavalry, and commanded the Royal Horse Guards squadron of the Household Cavalry in the South Africa campaign. The Earl of Arran is the Chairman of Bovril, Ltd.

I.C.R. PICTURES PROVE POPULAR

New York. Crowd See Them With Election Returns. At one of the principal Bulletin Stations of New York on election night the waiting thousands on the street, eager for the election returns, had also an opportunity of viewing some very beautiful pictures of the scenery along the line of the Intercolonial Railway. It is the custom at the Bulletin displays to entertain the crowd, during the period between and instructive views, the New York Herald Management never permitting anything in the nature of low comedy, or any direct advertising. On this occasion the operator decided upon the intercolonial pictures which had been gladly furnished at his request. Twenty-four views were flashed upon the screens, these being selected from every portion of the line. In a letter thanking the I. C. R. authorities for the use of the slides the operator observes that the pictures proved most interesting, and were viewed by no less than 50,000 people.

CANADA'S NAVAL PLANS.

OTTAWA, Nov. 18.—Canada's Naval plans, laid before Parliament yesterday, provide for the construction of three cruisers of the "Improved Bristol" class, and four destroyers of "Improved River" class. The cost of the Cruisers is estimated at \$5,750,000 and the cost of Destroyers at \$1,500,000. The annual cost of maintenance will be \$2,000,000. Two Cruisers are assigned to the Pacific Coast and one Cruiser and four Destroyers to the Atlantic Coast. 1,408 officers and men will be required to man the ships. The pay roll will be \$400,000 and the victualling \$100,000 a year. There is also a Military program extending the plan already in operation. There is a guarantee of co-operation by the Canadian Militia Authorities with the Imperial Government Staff, an exchange of officers with Great Britain, and training of the Canadian Forces upon the British System. The Canadian program is based on the results of the Imperial Defence Conference in London and the conference which the Canadian Minister of Militia and Minister of Marine had with British authorities. Several noted lecturers will use Intercolonial Railway views to illustrate their lectures this winter, and the attractions of the "People's Railway" will thus be displayed to audiences of a refined and cultured class.
