four-year-old green pacer owned by Mrs. L. E. Britton of Harland and one the writer is proud to own and expects to drive, the chestnut pacer mare Connie Clegg 2:17 1/2. We are planning to have a matinee race on June 19th with four classes, each of two dashes. We will also hold a race meet July 1st and Old Home Week in August when there is a possibility of the track record of 2:05 1/2, made by Ray Henley, driven by Ernie Avery in 1935, may be lowered. Thanks, Lorne, we are glad the sport is going so well in Woodstock.

We had the pleasure of looking over the H. & S. Stables at the Charlottetown track a few days ago when they were parading for our inspection. Billy McVay 2:06 3/4 was the fastest four-year-old pacer in the Maritime last season with his record taken September 8th at Charlottetown, driven by Walter Craig, and winner of 21 dashes. This year he is expected to lower his record substantially. Rosalie Hooper took a three-year-old record of 2:18 last season, winning fourteen dashes and over \$1,000. She will probably race as fast as her stable companion Billy did as a four-year-old. Shirley H. Temple 2:14 increased her winnings to \$1,547.00 and is eligible to the 2:22 class.

And now we come to the younger members of the stable, which much is expected, notably the three-year-old twins, Sister Verma and Sister Mary by Kalmuck 2:15 1/2, dam, Terrie Aubrey by Captain Aubrey 2:07 1/2, granddam, Margaret Gratian 2:15 by Gratian Royal 2:05 1/2. Kalmuck was 28 years old when he aired these twins. They are very handsome, absolutely sound, with grand bone and have every appearance of speed. The prize package in the stable in our opinion is Bug-one Hand Over, foaled Feb. 9th, 1948, by Calumet Budlong 2:02 1/2, dam, Margaret Laurel by Laure, Hanover 1:59 1/2 by The Laurel, Hanover 1:58 1/2, granddam Margaret Aubrey by Captain Aubrey 2:07 1/2. Margaret Aubrey is the dam of Alma Budlong 2:08, May Budlong 2:10, Aubrey Budlong 2:12 1/2 and others. This yearling is one of the best formed and largest we have ever seen in this country. He carries all the earmarks of breeding and good authorities who have seen him pronounce him near perfect. By the way, his dam Margaret Laurel, that showed so well as a two-year-old and then met with an accident, is being trained again this season. We watched her the other day and believe she will be found representing the H. & S. Stables later on.

Anyone who looks over the H. & S. Stables will come to the conclusion that Prince Edward Island can turn out as good trotters and pacers as far away Kentucky providing good sires and dams are selected and the progeny is given good care, good feeding and good training. In this connection we would like to pay a tribute, which Colonel Hooper says is very greatly deserved, to Gene Gaubrier, an expert in the care and feeding of horses, who looks after them during the off-season. The training, driving and shoeing is done by Walter Craig, a young Scotchman twenty years of age and a real lover of horses. The

shows are made by Peter Conroy and Peter Gallant, two men of wide experience. Peter Conroy is an ex-trainer and driver of long experience with such outstanding horses as Longset 2:06 1/2, Hilda B. 2:16, Baby Logan 2:16 1/2, Money-maker 2:17 and dozens of others that passed through his hands.

We thank our friend Cecil H. McKinley of Houlton, Maine, for harness horse news of the Pine Tree State. "The racing season will start July 4th in Northern Maine and indications point to some fast new performers that will make their appearance on the circuit at Houlton. A drawing card will be the \$1,000 Free For All. Possible starters will be Nancy Wyeth 2:06 1-5, owned by Leo Ervin, Houlton; Bonnie Volo 2:04 1/2, owned by Chris O'Donnell, Houlton; Indiana Boy 2:06 1/2, owned by E. B. Brown, Woodstock; Dale H. 2:06, and Scotty H. 2:06 1/2, from Fort Fairfield, Four Freedoms 2:04 1/2, with a possibility of Roy, Jr. 2:04 1/2, owned by Allison Langille, St. Stephen; McKiv Cash 2:02, owned by George B. Gay, Moncton, and Scott Spencer 2:06, owned by Harry Hirsch, Sneyre, taking part. Among the other prominent starters for this race meet will be Hustler, recently purchased by Murray Wright of Andover, N.B. He has a trotting mark of 2:39 1-5 and is also a very handy pacer.

taking home after they picked them up and promptly threw them away. Later in the evening the Ervay children picked up three or four of the thinly feathered underdeveloped birds on their lane while bringing home the cat.

A resident of Pisquid, who doesn't shoot but who feeds the Huns every winter, told me he was simply amazed at the actions of four hunters, suspected to be visiting gunners from the U. S. According to my informant this party of hunters walked up to a covey after their hunting dogs had pinned it down in an open field and fired into the birds while they were bunched on the ground, practically wiping out the covey. Another farmer who lives in the same district reported that he had a turkey that raised the second brood of eleven. When the Hun season opened they were approximately the size of cock pheasants. Two cars appeared on the scene early in October and after a heavy barrage of shots the mother turkey and one lone poult arrived home. No trace was found of the remaining ten. A covey of Huns was known to frequent the same field as the turkey brood and the farmer was under the impression it was the Huns that were under fire. When he got suspicious it was too late to do any first hand investigating.

Additional complaints were voiced by farmers from the districts of Bradshaw, Waterside and Orwell. One objected to single coveys being hunted down to almost the last bird. Two others were of the opinion that visiting gunners took a crack at whatever moved whether it was in season or not.

This threat of posting property may not materialize this coming year but unless hunters adopt a more sporting attitude in future Enclosed Property signs may soon become a common sight along our country roads. This is just a gentle reminder boys and a word to the wise should be sufficient.
