The Opening of the Lambeth Conference—Ceremonial Reception in Canterbury Cathedral.

I: Canterbury Cathedral, on Satur-day July 5th, the chair of St. Augus-tine stood on the predella. The sight of it there, standing empty before the high altar, must have stirred the imagination of every member of the waiting congregation in the choir, save only those who are insensitive to his-oric association. No man knows the age of this ancient chair; but from time immemorial it has been that in which successive Archbishops of Canterbury have been enthroned.

The occasion was the service for the reception of the Archbishops and Bishops who are attending the Lam-beth Conference. The Cathedral has witnessed many historic scenes, but never before had more than three hundred bishops of the Anglican Communion assembled within its walls. They passed from the west door to the altar steps in double file, and the length of the procession ex-ceeded that of the Cathedral. It seemed unending, and one needed to know the names of but a few of the dioceses which those Bishops rule to

have one's imagination stirred afresh, this time by the astonishing growth of the Anglican Communion through-out the world.

Ninety years ago, except for the American Bishops there were only ten Anglican Bishops outside the British Isles. Today the Anglican Episcopate comprises roughly four hundred men. Most of them serve in self-governing provinces of the Church, but about forty are, in their missionary dioceses, under the jurisdiction of the Archbishop of Canter-bury. All of them look to Canter-bury as their mother Church, and to the incumbent of the see as their patriarch. On Saturday his Grace received them standing before St. Augustine's chair, and with his primate's cross in his hand. At the head of the procession was the Arch-bishop of York, followed by fourteen bishops and Metropolitan. Thereafter came the main body of the episcopal army, home bishops, Ameri-can Bishops, Dominion Bishops, and missionary Bishops, all marshalled irrespective of any order of preced-ence based on the prestige of their sees, except only that they were led by the Bishop of London and the Bishop of Durham.

The scene when all had come to rest on the great flight of steps which raises the high altar of Canterbury higher than any in England, and on the space before it, was extraordi-narily impressive. Near the altar also but behind the Archbishop's chair was the Eastern delegation, of whom His Beatitude the Patriarch Meletios II. was the chief.

The Archbishop sat in his chair, and the ce addressed the company.

The address was felicitous in language and inspiring in suggestion. Perfectly delivered, one could not imagine the duty being more fitly discharged. After the address, all joined in reciting, without musical note, the Nicene Creed. The Dean read the lesson (Eph. iv. 1-16), and then all turned to the East for the singing of the Te Deum.

Some prayers followed, prayers for the Conference, for the Church, for the unity of all Christian people, for the conversion of the world, for the preservation of peace. Then the Archbishop imparted a threefold benediction.

While the hymn, "City of God, how broad and far," was sung, the Arch-bishop was conducted through the choir to the nave steps where he spoke briefly to the people in the nave, and blessed them also.

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
