The gates that led to the train had opened and the two friends walked slowly toward them, arm in arm.

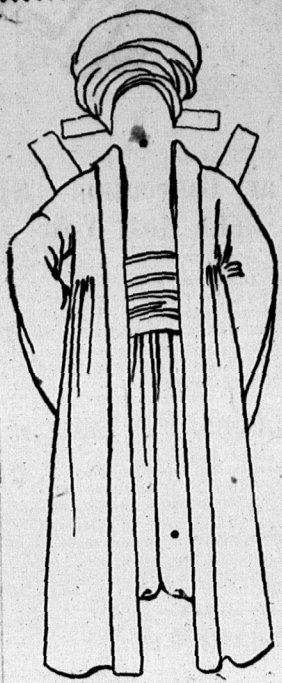
"That's funny," May remarked, presently. "He told me his wife died fifteen years ago when this girl was born—He told me she was living at his farm up near Pittsfield."
