Mr. B. F. Woolner Is Laid To Rest

The following notice will be of interest to many relatives and friends in this Province and is taken from the Suisun Calif. Solano Republican of May 30th.

Friday morning marked the close of a long and useful life, when B. F. Woolner, 93 years of age, a pioneer resident of this community, died at 12:30 o'clock at his home on Suisun Street, Like the caravan that has traveled its many miles over its broad space of country, finally draws up at the end of its journey, so the good old man reached the "welcome goal" quietly and peacefully, to rest and receive his well earned reward, following his sojourning of nearly a century through this vale of tears, with its joys and sorrows, its trials and its victories.

The funeral services were held at the family residence at 2:30 p.m. Sunday afternoon, when hundreds of old time friends and relatives, came to pay their last respects and to bring myriads of beautiful flowers, tokens of love and esteem. Rev. Edmund Owens of the local Congregational church delivered the funeral sermon and a quartette composed of Miss Anna Kyle, Miss Martha Piotrow, Miss E. Jones and G. R. Jones sang two beautiful hymns.

"There'll Be No Night," and "Lead Kindly Light." The Pallbearer, the deceased were Edward Dinkelspiel, E. E. Long, Lambert Sternberg, C. M. Turner, Jas. C. Murphy, and W. U. Goodman.

A brief service was held at the Cemetery, with scriptural reading by Rev. Owens.

Mr. Woolner was the rugged, unassuming type of pioneer that builds communities, and makes for better living conditions. He loved the great out of doors, and the things of nature, and was a staunch Christian, with a great many fine traits of character.

His integrity and genial personality made for him many warm old time friends and relatives, who will miss his cheery salutation with which he was wont to greet everyone whom he met. He was a keen business executive, and by his ardent industry his modest holdings at the beginning have grown to some considerable proportions.

Deceased is survived by his widow, Mrs. Flora Woolner, and two sons, E. R. Woolner of Suisun Valley, and Attorney B. F. Woolner of Oakland.

Benjamin F. Woolner was born at Suffolk, Suffolkshire, England October 18, 1830, and three years later, 1833, was brought by his parents to Prince Edward Island, where he grew to man-hood.

He came to California, by way of the Isthmus of Panama in 1859 and located in Suisun Valley, where he resided until 1905 when he moved to his new home in Suisun.

Mr. Woolner returned to Prince Edward Island in 1869 where he was married to Miss Flora MacNeil on October 15th. The couple have made several trips back to the old home the last visit being in 1909. For many years he and Mrs. Woolner lived on the farm now owned by Peter Mortensen which was sold by Mr. Woolner in 1911, retaining several other holdings in the Valley, one of which the marvelous old man farmed himself until December

The Way To Graft

The best way to graft the trees is to pick out some well-located limb that is one and one-half inches in diameter. Cut it off squarely and split it in the centre so that the wedge-shaped graft can be inserted at each end of the split. The object is to put these wedge-shaped scions in so that the cambium layer, or inner bark, of both the stock and scion touch. Then all exposed surfaces should be well covered with grafting wax. This should include the tips of the grafts or scions. There are various methods of grafting, but this is the most simple and practical one. If you use care in getting the two cambium layers to touch, and thoroughly cover the exposed surfaces with grafting wax, the results will be good.
