MEAT PIE WITH BISCUIT TOPPING
1/2 lb. raw beef, sliced, or 1 cup sliced liver meat; 2 tablespoons fat; 1 1/2-cup Heinz Condensed Vegetable Soup; 1 cup water; 1/2 teaspoon salt; dash cayenne pepper; dash for 1/2 standard recipe for baking powder biscuits.

Brown meat in fat. If raw meat is used cook thoroughly. Combine meat, soup, water and seasonings and pour into a well-greased casserole (5" x 8"). Put biscuits dough in 1/2" thick-ness and cut with a 2" biscuit cutter. Arrange on top of meat mixture. Bake in a hot oven (400° F.) for 20 minutes or until biscuits are golden brown. Serves 2 or 3.

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COOK'S CORNER

DATE BRAN MUFFINS

This muffin belongs definitely to the sweet course. We would suggest, in fact, that served with a cup of hot cocoa or a glass of chocolate milk, according to your inclination at the time, a date muffin with just a smidgen of butter would make a very acceptable sweet course in itself.

1 1/2 cups once-sifted pastry flour or 1 cup once-sifted hard-wheat flour

4 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 cup brown sugar, lightly packed

1 cup natural bran

3 tablespoons shortening

1 cup chopped pitted dates

1 egg, well beaten

1/2 cup milk

1/2 cup water

1 teaspoon vanilla

Measure and sift together the flour, baking powder, salt and cinna- mon; mix in brown sugar and bran.

Cut in the shortening rather finely. Mix in the dates all at once. Combine the beaten egg, milk, water and vanilla.

Form a well in the dry ingredi- ents, add the liquids all at once and mix lightly.

Two-thirds fill buttered muffin pans with batter.

Bake in a moderately hot oven, 375 degrees, about 30 minutes for average-sized muffins.

The questions are those which have reached the Wartime Prices and Trade Board from housewives in this region. The answers are pro- vided by the Board Readers. Per- sons who have intelligent ques- tions on price control are invited to send them in writing to the Women's Regional Advisory Com- mittee of the War Time Price and Trade Board.

Q. I have some meat stored in a locker. Will I have to give up coupons to get it out?

A. No. Not at the present time. However, you will have to surren- der coupons for meat taken from Rogers after rationing is effected.

Q. Some friends tell me I can get dairy butter without any cou- pons?

A. Your friends are mistaken. Dairy butter is rationed the same as creamery butter. You must give up one coupon for every half pound purchased.

Q. I understand that all meat must be stamped. My butcher had some pork recently. Is it stamped. Is he obeying regulations?

A. All meat slaughtered for sale must be stamped showing that the slaughterer had a permit. Regulation has been in effect since July 24.

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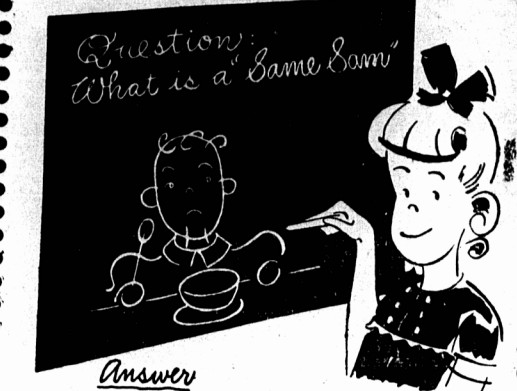
