

Petrograd Hopes For Better Days

PETROGRAD, Oct. 5.—Hope that some day the capital of Russia will be transferred back to Petrograd is buoying up the spirits of many residents of this ghost like city that Peter the Great built to serve as the center of Russian power.

No official word, not even a semi-official hint, has been given that the Bolshevik regime will return to the capital here from Moscow, but many Petrogradites base their hopes that this will occur on the fact that Petrograd was built for business purposes and is far more fitted to house government offices than overcrowded Moscow.

If the time does come that the Bolshevik officials lose their fear of attack from outside these Petrograd residents say the government inevitably must return to the city that offers it comfortable quarters and immediate proximity by land and sea, to Western Europe. While the fear of attack exists these same features of Petrograd's location make it a dangerous spot for a capital, Finland is too close and the Finnish Gulf and the Neva offer anchorage for foreign warships.

Buying up Property.
Shrewd citizens are now buying up Petrograd's property and holding it against the day when the now almost depopulated city shall again be the crowded capital.

The Petrograd port has shown great activity. The steamer and motor of the factory chimneys of the city and suburbs are still smokeless, and the streets, as compared with busy Moscow, seem like those of a country village.

A few pedestrians, an automobile or two; now and then a horse-drawn carriage, and the scattering of cabs in the great broad avenues laid out by Peter the Great to make Petrograd magnificent, seem to be lost in the city's splendor.

Great government buildings that border the squares and squares of the main industries at Moscow. Huge palaces are empty, occupied only by caretakers, or transformed into museums, open but a few hours each week and even then visited only by sightseeing tourists. Now and then a little group of art students.

Many shops are open selling mostly second-hand furniture and costly bric-a-brac from the houses of the once great, but business is dull and money is much scarcer than in speculation, seemingly prosperous Moscow.

CITY OF HULL HAS UNIQUE CLASS OF TENANTS.

LONDON, Oct. 4.—The City of Hull, Yorkshire, has a unique class of tenants those who pay neither rent nor rates, in a working-class neighborhood in that city there are six hundred and one tenants for which the occupants have not paid any rent nor taxes for four years. This statement is given on the authority of the Hull correspondent of the London Daily News, who adds that the authorities on property law say that they have never heard of a similar case.

A conscientious tenant in the group became tired of waiting for the landlord's agent to call for the rent, and went to the agent's office about the matter. "Go away," said the agent, "don't bother me with rent when I want it I will call for it."

Since then none of the tenants in Hull has heard from the landlord. In question have seen the landlord, nor has any one of them been asked to pay the tax rates. The Hull authorities recently insisted on repairs to the houses being affected, but the occupants were not asked to pay for the work.

This might seem like a little bit of paradise, but it has one drawback—there is always the danger that the favorable tenants may sometime be asked to pay up. They say they would not be able to pay the arrears. In the meantime they are not worrying.

MAKE \$188,000 PROFIT DURING FOUR YEARS

TORONTO, Oct. 2.—For the past four years the Methodist Book Room has been able to turn over a surplus of \$188,047 to the church according to the report to be made at the general conference.

The total turnover for the quadrennium was almost five million dollars—to be exact, \$4,995,969, as compared with \$3,292,946 for the previous four years. That is an increase of \$1,703,023, and one on this large turnover had to be taken \$253,432 for capital and interest charges, leaving the net surplus of \$188,047. For the four years previous the surplus was \$175,790.

The net capital at the close of the quadrennium was \$340,000, as compared with \$720,000 four years ago.

Last Presentation Of Passion Play

BERLIN, Oct. 5.—The last Oberammergau performance of the season—the sixty-ninth presentation this year—has just been held. It was announced today that 317,000 visitors saw the Passion Play this year, paying a total of twenty million marks in admission fees. It is estimated that the visitors spent another two hundred million in the village. The villagers have refused a film offer made by an American concern, which offered one billion four hundred million marks for the privilege of filming the performance.

Zoo Elephant Saving Pennies

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Indarini, the big Indian elephant which carries children at the London Zoological Gardens, is improving in grace and wisdom under the tuition of her new mahout—Syed Ali.

First, Syed Ali taught her to be docile and obey orders. She had been on strike for a year, during which time she ate her head off and idled because she did not approve the new steel mounting ladder.

Next Syed Ali taught her to be industrious and work for her living. (She can earn \$1,500 a year plying for hire in the gardens.) Now he has taught the great beast to be thrifty.

Nearly every child in the Zoo classifies one or two round flat brown things (pennies) in a fat little fist. These coins are not good to eat, but they help to protect a deserving elephant against the hardships of old age. Indarini delicately accepts these if offered, or picks them up from the ground when they are dropped.

She hands them to Syed Ali to keep for her, and the pair go over their accounts after the day's work is over.

Duns and bits are used for Indarini's immediate needs and are never passed over to the mahout.

DUTY IMPOSED BY U.S. GOVERNMENT ON SILVER FOX SKINS

The new tariff bill, recently acted by Congress at Washington, imposes a duty of 50 per cent on all raw and dressed Silver Fox skins imported into the United States, so that, from now on, all Silver Fox skins, destined for Messrs. C. M. Lampson & Co.'s London Sales, should be forwarded direct to London and not to Alfred Fraser for shipment.

The passage of this law will prevent the consignment of silver fox skins to New York for sale in the United States, as for the present at least, it does not seem possible that a high enough price can be obtained in this country to overcome a duty of 50 per cent which the shipper of silver fox skins will be obliged to pay.

It would, therefore, seem that the bulk of the Canadian collection of silver fox skins will have to be marketed in London. The enclosed circular gives the necessary information as to the method of packing and forwarding silver fox skins by parcel post to London. Additional information will be supplied upon request.

U. S. HORSE OWNER RELIEVED OF ROLL BY MONTREAL VAMP.

MONTREAL, Oct. 4.—John Reatie, a horse-owner from the Southern United States, laid a complaint to the courts here today that of Saturday night last, he had been enticed into a house up town by a woman, robbed by her of \$500 and later had been blindfolded, thrown into an automobile taken outside the city and robbed of a further \$1600.
