As the time for the great plebiscite approaches there is a marked increase of interest throughout the Dominion. The apathy of the earlier weeks of the campaign has given way to a lively concern for the result in both camps. Great activity has developed in the temperance ranks and hundreds of public meetings are being held weekly in every province.

The result in Quebec is looked upon as a vital, as it is not believed by the liquor men that the government, as the strong opponents of coercion in the case of Manitoba, would propose a prohibitory law with Quebec or any other province opposed. But if Quebec should, with all the other provinces, give a majority for the abolition of the traffic, then the government would have no alternative but to introduce a bill at the earliest opportunity.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Toronto Globe, referring to the talk of a federal election, gives the opinion that there will be no dissolution till the full term of the parliament has expired. That is the way it ought to be.

Under the new policy of the Emmerston government in New Brunswick of subsidising flour mills the sites of nine mills have been approved and one mill is already in operation and doing excellent work.

The Emperor of China is now introducing reforms so rapidly that fears are expressed that he is going too fast. By successive edicts he seeks to establish graded schools and colleges, given freedom to the press and extend the postal system throughout the empire.

The New York Voice devotes a good deal of space to the discussion of the Canadian plebiscite which it says has attracted a lively interest in the United States and throughout Europe. "It is not merely a Canadian election," says the Voice, "that is to be held Sept. 29 next; but an election in which the moral and material interest of the whole round globe are deeply concerned. Would to God that we could make every Canadian voter see that as we see it!"

Warden Foster of the Dorchester penitentiary was in this city at the recent races. Some time since there was a report that Hon. David Laird of this city had been appointed to investigate certain charges against the management of the penitentiary. Now the Moncton Transcript rises to remark that "the Liberal party demands at the hand of the government a strong vigorous and fair investigation, made and conducted under circumstances that will satisfy the Liberal party that it is not a mere pro form a inquiry."

The Literary Digest publishes the result of a newspaper plebiscite in regard to the disposal of the Phillipine Islands. Out of 192 papers replying 89 were in favor of retaining possession of the whole group; 63 favored a naval station only; 15 are for an American protectorate; and seven were for a joint protectorate by the United States and Spain.

The Daily Record of Saint John N. B., in a recent issue tells the story of the first morning penny paper published in British North America. It was fifty nine years ago that Mr. G. E. Fenety started the publication of The Morning News in St. John. Previous to that time the province had nothing better than weekly journals of which there were then four printed in St. John and three others in various parts of the province outside that city.
