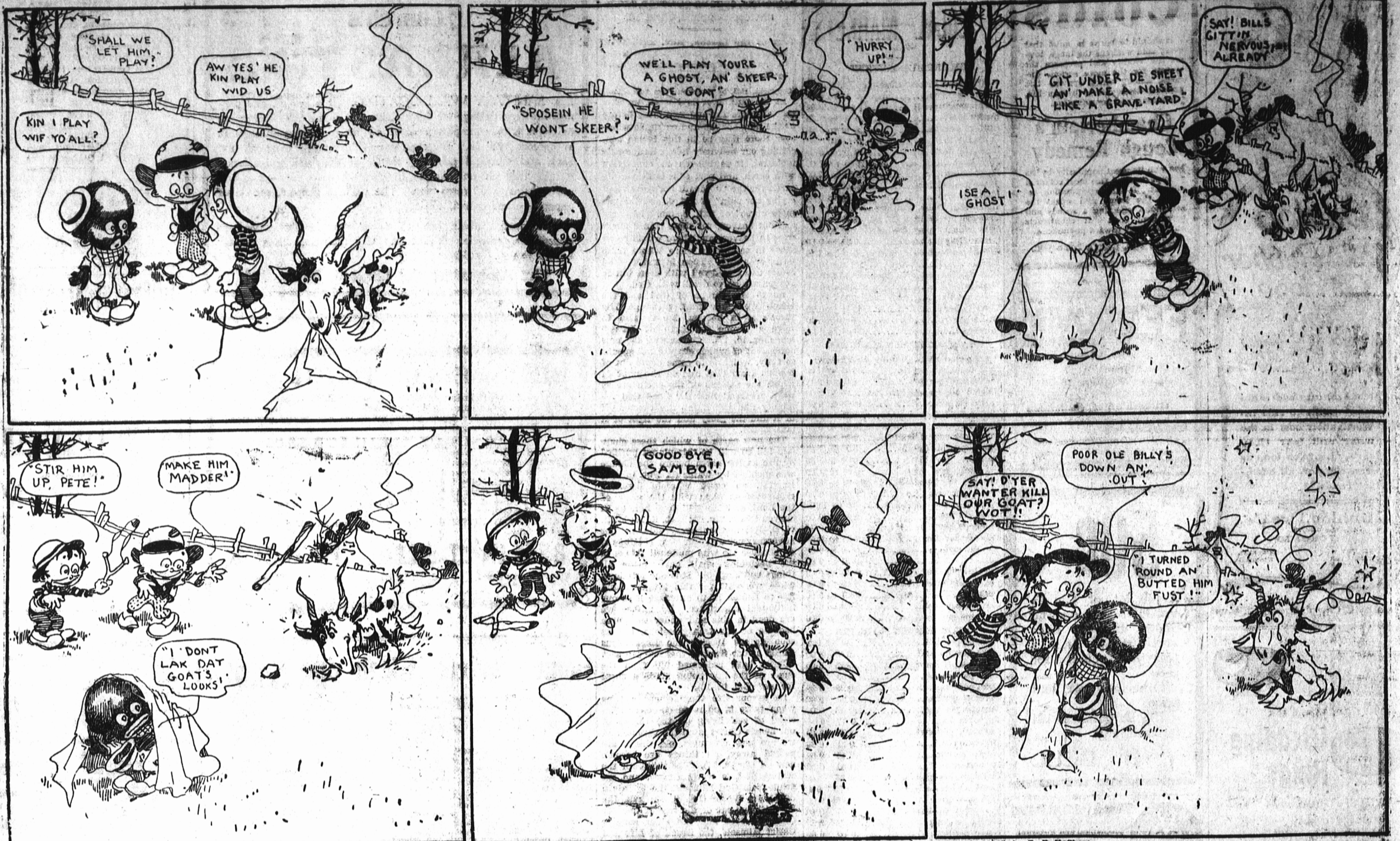

ARTIST BOUGHTON.
 Something of the Man Who Died in London Recently.
 George H. Boughton, who died the other day in London, Eng., was well known in Canada. Many of his works have been engraved and have thus been popularized. He was a genre painter, and had a predilection for subjects dealing with the Puritans and the life of the Pilgrim Fathers. This was partly accounted for by the fact that he spent his boyhood and early manhood in the United States. He was born in 1844, near Norwich, England, which claims as its own the Cromes and their school of landscapists, but he was brought out to America when 3 years old by his parents, who settled in Albany, N.Y.
 His painting was self-taught. When 21 he made a sketching tour through the English lake country, Scotland and Ireland. From Albany he removed to New York in 1868, and later, after a short residence in Paris settled in London. His pictures exhibited at the Royal Academy in 1868, "Through the Fields," and "Hop-Pickers Returning," attracted attention. He was elected a National Academician in 1871, but it was not until 1879 that the Royal Academy made him an associate, nor was it until 1896, on a vacancy occurring through the appointment of Sir John Millais as president, that he was raised to the full honor of academician. He constantly exhibited, and it was said he never had a picture refused since he was quite a youth.
 An exceptional number of his works are to be found in the galleries and collections of U. S. collectors. His "Edict of William the Testy," is in the Corcoran gallery at Washington. The "Diamond Swamp," one of his best efforts, is owned by August Belmont. The "March of Miles Standish" and "Going to Seek His Fortune" were acquired by G. Whitney. A series of "Swallows in Spring, Autumn and Winter," belongs to Morris K. Jessup, and C. S. Smith's collection contained half a dozen of his pictures, while he was represented in the collections of F. Rogers of Philadelphia and W. T. Walters of Baltimore. He published various short stories, and in collaboration with E. A. Abbey recorded some "Rambles in Holland," in 1888.

Fastest of Cruisers.
 The turbine-engined Amethyst has just completed her trials and proves to be the fastest cruiser in the world. Built by Armstrong, Whitworth & Co., she was designed to do 21 knots, and has accomplished 23.65. Her further advantages consist of a remarkable economy in the consumption of coal at high speeds, and in the small space occupied by her engines.

Automobiles in India.
 Automobility is making steady progress in India, and patrons have not been found wanting who are ready to lend valuable aid in furthering the industry and pastime there. His Highness the Maharajah of Kapurthala has, says The Car, an electrically driven vehicle, which was built by Kriger of Paris and is the only one of its kind in India. Its silent and graceful running always excites enthusiasm wherever it goes. The Maharajah of Kapurthala, by the way, has quite a number of motor vehicles, and it is possible that one of these may compete in the forthcoming reliability trials between Delhi and Bombay, for which he contemplates giving a cup. The Gaikwar of Baroda, who is, perhaps, better known in England than any other eastern potentate, has also offered a handsome trophy for the reliability trials. It is hoped that the stimulus thus offered to the development of automobilism in India will have its due effect, and that amateur owners to whom only is the trial open will be induced to visit India with their cars. The road from Delhi to Bombay is a magnificent highway, as good as the Great North road, while perfect weather is invariably assured to the traveler between the months of October and March.
