**MONTREAL, Oct. 25.**—Cattle receipts 1,440 good steers were slow sellers. Good cows were just steady or a shade lower. Plain cows and common to medium heifers were in fair demand, \$6.25 was likely to be the top for good steers and the bulk of the sales between \$5.25 and \$6.00. Good cows were from \$4.75 to \$5.00 and medium quality cows with common heifers brought \$4.00 to \$4.50. Bologna bulls were higher, sales ranging from \$8.00 to \$9.75 with the bulk around \$3.25 to \$3.50.

**Quotations:** Butcher steers good \$6. to \$6.25, medium \$5.50 to \$6.00, \$5.25 to \$5.55. Good cows were \$4.50 to \$5.50, medium \$4.00 to \$4.50, common \$3.50 to \$4.00.

**THE MARKETS**

**MONTREAL, Oct. 25.**—The foreign demand for Canadian grain on the market today showed little improvement and business generally was quiet. There was some inquiry from outside sources for vessels for full cargoes of grain for November loading to the continent and thirty five cents per hundred pounds was bid with forty cents per hundred pounds asked. The market for car lots of Canadian western oats was weaker and prices were reduced one cent per bushel. No. 2 c.w. were quoted at 71 cents, No. 3 c.w. at 67 cents per bushel. The under tone to the market for spring wheat grades of flour was steady with a fair amount of business passing. The winter wheat situation was firm on account of the continued limited offerings from Ontario millers and the good demand. The demand for millfeed continued active and prices were unchanged. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats was fairly good and prices ruled firm. Prices for all grades of fresh and storage eggs were well maintained under a good demand. The receipts were 723 cases. The feature of the potato trade was the stronger feeling that developed in market and prices for N. B. stock advanced ten to twenty cents per bag and for Quebec 30 cents per bag. This was attributed to the increased demand from all sources. Sales of New Brunswick Green Mountains were made \$1.90 to \$2 per bag, Quebec whites at \$1.80 per bag of 90 lbs. Trade in beans was quiet but the tone of the market was firm. Car lots of choice white hand picked were quoted at \$2.55 to \$2.60 per bushel, and broken lots at \$2.35 per bushel. Only small volume of business was done in butter today but prices were steady. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 34 cts. to 34 1/2 cts. per pound. Receipts were 298 packages. Owing to the higher prices paid at the country boards at the close of last week for cheese a stronger feeling developed today in the local market and asking prices were advanced 1/2 cent to 3/4 cent per pound, western grades were quoted at 17 1/2 cents to 18 1/2 cents per pound and eastern grades at 17 1/2 cents per lb. Market was quiet, the receipts were 4,543 boxes.

**OTTAWA, Oct. 25.**—With further decrease of fresh eggs, egg markets show added strength this week. Storage eggs continue to move into consumption freely at practically all points. A car of storage seconds is rolling to Toronto costing 28 1-2 lbs. Winnipeg and a car of the same grade from Calgary costing 27 1-2 lbs. Toronto—The market is firm on the best grades of fresh dealers are paying for ungraded eggs delivered extras 48 to 50, firsts 40 to 41, seconds 30 to 31. Prices to retailers of fresh are extras 55 to 57, firsts 45 to 47, seconds 35 to 36. Poultry paying prices for live chicken 5 to 6 lbs 25c, 3 1-2 to 4 lbs 18 to 22c, heavy fowl 20 to 21, medium 18, light 14 to 15.

**MONTREAL.**—Quotations for ungraded eggs delivered are extras 48 to 54, firsts 40 to 44, seconds 30 to 35, the demand for fresh exceeds the supply. Prices to retailers of fresh are extras 55 to 56, firsts 46 to 48, seconds 38 to 40, storage extras 44, firsts 39 to 40, seconds 35. Poultry is arriving freely with no change in prices.

**WINNIPEG.**—The market is higher with a further decline of fresh receipts. Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 39 to 42, firsts 37, seconds 30. Prices to retailers of fresh extras 46, firsts 43, seconds 35. Storage extras 41, firsts 38, seconds 32.

**SASKATCHEWAN.**—Fresh receipts are practically nil. Dealers quoting extras 38, firsts 35, seconds 27. Prices to retailers storage extras 42 to 43, firsts 40, seconds fresh extras 47 to 48, firsts 40 to 45, seconds 38-39. Poultry dealers are paying for No. 1 chicken 16, No. 1 fowl over four pounds 13, under four pounds 10.

**CALGARY.**—Practically no fresh arriving. Dealers quoting country points extras 35, firsts 32, seconds 35. B. C. pullet extras are arriving freely and selling to retailers at 48. Prices to retailers

WANNIPEG, Man., Oct. 25.—Starting in with delapidated old knife, a railway sleeping car porter, working between Winnipeg and Vancouver, has become a sculptor of note. He has already carved out of black mahogany and white pine busts of King George, King Edward VII, the Prince of Wales, Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railway system and many other personages of note. The artist, who is a resident of Winnipeg, is a negro, who taught himself the art and has never taken a lesson. His name is Roscoe Williams.

It is during the spare hours of his long runs between the prairie metropolis and the Pacific coast that Mr. Williams does most of his sculpturing work. He carved the likeness of Sir Henry Thornton on two trips.

Mr. Williams has now ceased work with wood, his modelling being done with clay and plasticine. His subjects are the heads of humans of all races, birds and animals, all of which he makes most lifelike.

He is now engaged on a statue of Miss Bessie Coleman, the colored aviatrix, who was killed in an aeroplane accident in Chicago some time ago. He plans to place several of his works on exhibition in Boston and New York soon.

HAVANA, Cuba, Oct. 25.—The first official estimate of the casualties issued yesterday by the Red Cross, from the great hurricane of last week—600 dead, 9,000 injured, and 6,000 families homeless—was unchanged today. In the city of Havana 117 bodies of storm victims have already been buried.

The Cuban government has found it necessary to ask for outside aid.
